**WILL TEST THE MILK**  
SUPPLIED TO HOUSES WHERE THERE ARE SICK

The Victorian Nurses Supplied With Milk-Testing Apparatus — They Will Report to Medical Health Officer.

The regular monthly meeting of the Victorian Order of Nurses was held in St. George's hall, on Thursday, with a large attendance of members. Several matters of interest to the work were discussed, chiefly the subject of pure and clean milk for sick children and infants. As the district work is not extensive enough at present to permit the establishment of free pure milk stations for distribution, the committee will provide the nurses with a milk testing apparatus, and where milk being used for the sick is found wanting in purity, cleanliness, or richness, the further analysis and action on same will be turned over to the medical health authorities, as well as the name of the dealer from whom it was procured.

The sub-committee appointed to look into the need of the Victorian Order nurse's services in Barrie and Cataraqui, reported from Barrie and a desire for the services of the nurse from a portion of the residents. Further action was left to the sub-committee.

Notable persons finding cases of illness unattended in extreme poverty are requested to report the matter to the Associated Charities, that speedy action may be taken to bring medical aid and nursing service to the same.

The nurses' report for March showed a total of 137 visits. The patients included Roman Catholics, 10; Methodists, 6; Anglicans, 11; Presbyterian, 1; Holiness Movement, 1. Donations were received from Mrs. M. Macgillivray, Ladies' Aid of Chalmers church, the L.U.B.A. Club of the Y.W.C.A., and Junior Relief of the Victorian Order.

**WARNING TO DRIVERS**

**OPPOSE AID TO 'VARSITY'**

Governors of Western University Aroused by Appeal.

London, Ont., April 2.—The appeal of Toronto university to the provincial government for aid to the extent of \$1,000,000, will be strongly opposed by those interested in Western university, who see the shutting out of any hope for the Western if the grant is made. A mammoth petition from all over western Ontario may be sent to the government objecting to the grant unless the Western university is also taken care of.

Captain T. J. Murphy, member of the board of governors of the Western, declared that the application for the grant by Toronto university was only a scheme to shut out the Western. "If there is a grant to be made, why not to Queen's? Queen's is a recognized Ontario university, and has enrolled about thirty-five students from western Ontario," he said.

"Toronto university is principally for the citizens of Toronto, and the city has never put up one cent for its arts department, and that is an actual fact. It is a scandal. We are supporting Toronto university now with our own money and yet cannot get a cent of our own money for our own institutions. Western Ontario is interested in the Western university, and being is no politics in the matter whatever."

An Inspector to Talk About the Carnegie Library Issues — A Farmer Came Under Ban of Market By-law.

Gananoque, April 3.—The annual business meeting of the Citizens' Union and Forwarding company was held at its offices on Wednesday. The financial report was of a very encouraging nature. It was also decided to make an addition to the dock sufficient to provide space for the storing of soft coal for their customers. These officers were elected for the current year: President, W. J. Gibson; vice-president, F. B. Cowan; secretary-treasurer, L. Shortall; directors, W. T. Simpson, C. K. Wright, D. Bain, L. P. Shortall.

On Tuesday evening in the lecture-room of Grace church a pleasing function was held under the auspices of the Willing Circle of King's Daughters, it taking the form of a farewell supper and presentation to Mrs. A. N. Parke, who is leaving for the west later part of this month. Those who have been an active and efficient worker in the circle, since its organization, seventeen years ago. Miss Jessie Haig made the presentation, after which addresses were given by Rev. Melvin Taylor, Rev. Walter Cox, Clifford Sime, W. J. Wilson and C. J. Wilson.

The regular monthly meeting of the local Board of Trade was held in the council chamber at the Town Park building, last evening, and drew out a goodly attendance.

Walter Nurse, Toronto, inspector of public libraries for the government, will address a special session of the Gananoque Board of Trade in the council room this (Friday) evening, on the Carnegie library question, cost of maintenance, efficiency, and all the other details that have been puzzling the brains of our ratepayers for the past year.

Michael Mangan, a farmer residing near Atkinson, was the first to fall under the ban of the market by-law. He was arraigned before Police Magistrate Garfield, on Wednesday, charged with peddling on the street in violation of the by-law. If being his first offence a nominal fine of \$2 without costs was imposed.

In accordance with instructions, received from the town council, Town Clerk Samuel McAmmon has called for tenders for alterations to the town hall. Limit of time for tendering, April 17th. A well attended session of the Woman's Auxiliary of Christ church was held in the parish house on Wednesday afternoon. Arrangements have been completed for a fine art exhibition, under the auspices of the local public schools, during the last week of April. Mrs. W. N. Miller, of Belleville, is the guest of her mother, Mrs. James McNuch, for a short time. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Ranger, who conducted the Arlington hotel for several years, have decided to remove to Pictou to locate, on or about May 1st.

**MEETING OF Y.M.C.A. CABINET**

An Educational Committee Appointed to Do Work.

As well as an executive committee, composed of the officers and chairman of the five standing committees, the Y.M.C.A. cabinet added an educational work committee when it adopted its new constitution, by-laws and Rules of Order" on Thursday evening. It was the adjourned March meeting.

Twenty-four scope is given this committee, its duties being to "seek to promote the educational work of the association, including such agencies as the library, reading-room, educational lectures, practical talks, and educational clubs and classes." It will consist of not more than seven and not less than five members.

One of the aims of the cabinet is to train its members in a proper and thorough manner of debating questions in session, and conducting business of well-ordered organizations. This new constitution, by-laws and rules of order are very pertinent in this respect.

This organization of the local Y.M.C.A. consists of twenty-five members, including the employed officers. Vacancies are filled from the senior membership. The object of the cabinet is to promote and foster the activities of the association. Under the present administration it is giving evidence of "health, happiness and activity." Nominations for the vice-presidency which is now provided for, and personnel of the new educational committee, will be made at the April meeting. A pledge has been affixed to the constitution for the acceptance of new members.

On Thursday evening the physical and social work and membership committees reported for the month, and plans of events they intend "pulling out."

**LIVE STOCK MARKET**

Prices Paid at the Union Stock Yards.

Union Stock Yards, Toronto, April 2.—Receipts were again light, only 32 cars, 296 cattle, 1438 hogs, 16 sheep and lambs, 25 calves.

Cattle.—Trade in cattle was slow even with a light run. The new rate of deducting \$2 per head of the price of cattle not deboned, was put in force yesterday, and will be rigidly enforced. Choice butchers' steers, \$7.50 to \$7.75; good butchers' steers, \$7 to \$7.30; medium butchers' steers, \$6.75 to \$7; common butchers' steers, \$7.25 to \$7.50; choice cows, \$6.75 to \$7; good cows, \$6.50 to \$6.75; canners, \$5 to \$4.50.

Feeders and stockers.—Few offered and market firm. Choice steers, \$6.00 to \$6.10; medium steers, \$5.75 to \$6; common steers, \$5.50 to \$5.75.

Milkers and springers.—Not many on sale and selling at \$60 to \$95 each, bulk sold at \$70 to \$80.

Calves.—Few on sale, not enough to make market. Choice veals, \$10 to \$11; good, \$9 to \$10; common, \$7 to \$9.

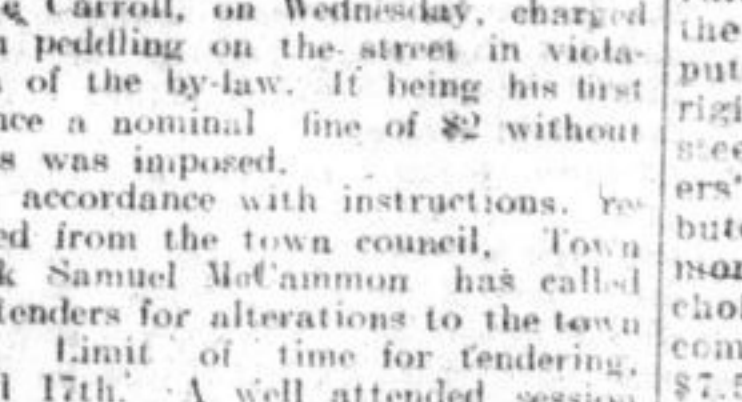
