CANNERIES TO POOL

THEIR OUTPUT THROUGH SELLING CORPORATION The Latest Organization Will Leave Only Half a Dozen "Independent" Plants in Ontario.

Toronto, April 3.—Forty of the "independent" canning companies in Ontario have entered into an agreement to market their entire output through a new sales corporation which has secured a provincial charter under the name of Canned Goods, Limited, capitalized at \$100,000. The company will have a board of twelve directors, representative of the partner factories, and its general sales agents for Canada will be W. H. Millman and Sons, Toronto.

Mr. Millman said that the new company will be making a public announcement in the course of a few days. At the same time it will announce its schedule of prices for canned goods for the season, which, he promised, will produce a favorable impression from the standpoint of cheapness. The company proposes to keep its prices down to a small margin of profit, securing greater economy by the pooling of the partners' output, thus regulating the supply more accurately to the demand and eliminating losses through the fierce competition which lately has been prevalent in the industry. It is said that each partner factory is to retain full control of its own administration, the pooling agreement extending only to the sale of products.

KINGSTON BOY LEAVES

To Take Position of Wireless Operator Aboard Ship George McLeod, aged sixteen years, a student at the Kingston Collegiate Institute, has been appointed a wireless operator on one of the ocean liners. He left to accept his new position. McLeod has been studying the wireless apparatus for the past couple of years. Some time ago, he, in company with a couple of boys from the institute, erected a wireless apparatus on the roof of the Kingston Collegiate Institute. After considerable work they were able to get in communication with some of the wireless stations in this vicinity.

COXEY FORMING NEW ARMY

Expects to Lead 500,000 Unemployed Men to Washington New York, April 3.—Jacob S. Coxe, leader of the famous "army" of unemployed which bore his name and marched on Washington in 1894, today established headquarters here. He said he would spend several days looking after plans for the mobilization of the New York wing of an army of 500,000 men, which he intends to lead into the national capital some time this month.

NO CLUE DISCOVERED

OF Woman Who Presented Baby at Watertown, N. Y.

Watertown Times, N. Y. The police have discovered the name of the woman who left the two-week-old baby girl in the New York Central passenger station in this city on the evening of March 23rd, but there is still no clue as to the whereabouts of the woman, who gave her name as Mrs. Storms and who came here from Kingston, Ont.

According to the information obtained by the police the woman purchased her ticket about 1.30 on the afternoon of March 23rd in Kingston to ride across on the ice in the stage that plies between Kingston and Cape Vincent in the winter time. She told the immigration authorities that she was coming to Watertown to visit relatives. Upon arriving at Cape Vincent she took the train to this city, arriving here about five o'clock, and from that time until the 6.30 train for Syracuse, she waited in the station with the baby.

At the station she told another woman that she expected someone here from the country to meet her and take her away, but when the passengers for the 6.30 train got out of the station, she disappeared, and left the baby behind her. Ever since that time the police have been working on the case, and although they have traced her back as far as Kingston, they have not been able to trace her beyond that point, and have no further information concerning her. Neither have they any information as to where she went from here or where she is now.

Whether the woman gave her right name is not known by the authorities, but a peculiar feature of the case is that the woman who left the baby here on that date gave the same name as that of the people who took one of the babies that was abandoned in the city during the past year.

GET AWAY BY RUSE

Frisco Officer Has Trying Time Attempting to Arrest 30.

San Francisco, April 3.—Singlehanded, Patrolman Michael Miller raided a gambling house in Chinatown and arrested thirty Chinese, but when he reached the police station he had only five in his party. "You should know better, Miller," admonished the desk sergeant, "then to try the arrest so many all by yourself. How did you expect to bring them all in?" "I've seen, sergeant," said Miller, "I haven't been on the Chinatown beat since the Chinese turned republicans and started to patronize the barber shops. In the old days an officer with a wooden leg could have brought in thirty of them without a bit of trouble, but when I made the raid and reached for their scalps, I found that every blessed one of them had got a haircut, which prevented tying their cues together."

Old C.P.R. Conductor Dies

Kempville, April 3.—Thomas Begley, who has been a resident of Kempville for the last few months, died here at the age of sixty-seven. The late Mr. Begley resided in Ottawa until about Christmas, when he moved to Kempville. He was conductor on the Prescott and Ottawa branch of the C.P.R. for a number of years, and formerly ran a train on the Brockville and Ottawa branch.
