CANADIAN RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION

Diagram showing why cost of constructing railways varies according to the way they are built. In view of the discussion before the Canadian House of Commons, on the Transcontinental Railway reports, this map will give an idea of the way the cost varies. In the first diagram rock cutting is avoided by making a double curve, the road crosses the creek at a low point where very little filling is required. A wooded trestle spans the gap. These features entail the use of a "pusher" engine, a low rate of speed, and a vast consumption of fuel. In the other case of rock-cutting (3) and "hill" (2) keep the line straight and comparatively level. A steel bridge (3) does away with danger and subsequent expense for upkeep. The result is a straight and smooth road upon which a modern heavy locomotive can haul at a nearly uniform speed a much larger train of loaded cars.
