

And God gave Him all power over every name in heaven and earth and under the earth, that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ, is Lord and We believe in Him and expect that He will come again to judge the quick and dead, and will render to every man according to his works. And He has poured out upon us abundantly the gift of the Holy Ghost the pledge of immortal ity, who maketh us to believe and obey and to be the sons of God the Father and fellow Theirs of Christ whom we confess and we adore one
