VICAR OF ST. PAUL'S DEALS WITH ST. PATRICK AND THE IRISH CHURCH

And Sets Forth Arguments That Church of Ireland is Independent of Rome
 In St. Paul's church on Sunday evening Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald took the subject of his sermon "St. Patrick and the Irish Church." In part he said:
 In a former sermon I showed from historical data St. Patrick's connection with the ancient British church. Here is his creed: "There is no other God besides God the Father and His Son Jesus Christ whom we confess to have been from everlasting from the Father and who was begotten before all things and by whom all things were made visible and invisible and who was made man and overcame death, and ascended into heaven to the Father. And God gave Him all power over every name in heaven and earth and under the earth, that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord and God. We believe in Him and expect that He will come again to judge the quick and dead, and will render to every man according to his works. And He has poured out upon us abundantly the gift of the Holy Ghost the pledge of immortality, who maketh us to believe and obey and to be the sons of God the Father and fellow heirs of Christ whom we confess and we adore one God in the Trinity of the sacred name."
 All this is very like modern Church of Ireland creeds and customs and very unlike the modern Roman creeds and customs. The conclusion drawn from above and from facts furnished in my former sermon, viz., that St. Patrick and his work were independent of Rome, is confirmed by the fact that the Irish usage differed from the Roman, e.g., the time for keeping Easter and the shape of the clerical tonsure. Trifling as these points seem to us, they were then matters of greatest importance. After St. Patrick's time came the great missionary period of the Irish church. Her children carried the cross to heathen England (now so called from the Saxons, Jutes and Angles who were not christian), France, Germany and Switzerland. Even Italy itself we find several Irish missionaries. I only here notice the work done in England for the sake of the light reflected upon the Church of Ireland.
 I have already shown that when St. Augustin arrived in England (597) bearing a commission from Pope Gregory I, the British bishops refused to accept Roman customs or to acknowledge him or the Bishop of Rome as having any authority over them.
 Laurentius, who succeeded Augustin, in a letter quoted by Bede, says: "We have learned through a Bishop of Ireland, Paganus, who has come over to Britain, that the Irish do not differ in any usages from the British in their usages for the Irish Bishop Paganus refused to eat at the same table with us or even under the same roof."
 One other instance to show the devotion of the Irish people to the "ancient faith" (Irish church). Wilfrid, an adherent of the Roman church, was nominated to the See of York (A.D. 664). A difficulty arose about his consecration because at that time (Bede III, 28) there was in Britain and Ireland only one bishop in communion with Rome. There were plenty of bishops of the British and Irish churches but "Rome did not admit those bishops to communion with her." I have dealt with the fact that St. Patrick himself never claims in his authenticated writings to be sent by Rome. Vide his "confessions," epistle to Coroticus and hymn.
 The first Roman legate to Ireland was Gille or Gillebet, who presided at synod of Rathbreasil but it was not till synod of Kells 1152, of Gassel, 1172, that the partial allegiance of Irish church was gained. I now point to a former sermon that the compact between Pope Adrian IV and Henry II was that "Peter's pence" be levied from each house as a concession to pope, and in return his holiness gave his blessing to Henry's Reformation of Ireland. From then to Reformation all the Irish bishops—say Walsh and Leveron—accepted Reformation, and as the continuation of a church is in its episcopate, so we are the historically continued ancient church of St. Patrick.
 In my former sermon I quoted a bull of Alexander III to Henry II, and of Adrian IV to Henry II, the learned Roman historian Baronius supports my position.
 Now, to deal with high flown quotations and references against my position—e.g., "Dicta Sancti Patricii." These are anonymous notes (date

FOUND FROZEN BODY OF LATE DAVID GREENIZEN, OF GANANOQUE

Who Disappeared Last Fall—Body Found Floating in Open Patch of Water by Frank S. Seymour.
 Gananoque, April 6.—Frank Seymour, residing on Water street, near the bay, while out on the ice yesterday afternoon, found in a patch of open water, there, the body of David Greenizen, who mysteriously disappeared last fall. He fastened a line on the body and went at once and reported his find. It is understood that a reward of \$250 will go to the discoverer. The deceased owned property to the value of some \$800 on the Kingston Road, which could not be sold or otherwise disposed of until satisfactory proof of his death could be obtained. This will, therefore, remove the burden of doubt and uncertainty under which the family has been laboring for months past.

This Week's Weather

A reactionary storm period is central from the 8th to the 11th of April. Storm conditions will show sudden developments—much warmer, south winds and low barometer merging into electrical storms with rain, hail, and wind very probable in western sections as early as the 8th. On that date the moon is on the celestial equator, approaching perigee and full moon on the 10th. Atmospheric conditions will be exceptionally favorable for hail storms for two to four days, beginning on the 8th.
