KINGSTON YACHT CLUB YOUNG COUPLE PARTED COMPANY WILL START

HELD ANNUAL MEETING ON MONDAY EVENING.

E. W. Waldron Was Elected Commodore by Acclamation—Club in a Prosperous Condition and Good Season's Sport is Looked For.

The annual meeting of the Kingston Yacht Club was held in the club building on Monday evening. Vice-Commodore E. W. Waldron, who was in the chair, stated that he was presiding in the absence of Commodore John McKay, who was unavoidably unable to be present. He read a telegram from Commodore McKay expressing his regrets at being unable to be present, and thanking the members for the support they had given him during the past year.

C. S. Kirkpatrick, secretary-treasurer, presented a favorable report of the club's finances, showing a small balance on hand.

The report of the regatta committee was read by the chairman, E. C. Gildersleeve, as follows: "Excellent races in all classes, excepting dinghies, were held during the season of 1913. The Bruce Carruthers and McKay Nelson trophy races were closely contested between Chirya, Heather, Isis, Chirya winning, each trophy. A cruising race to the Dominion Lands, Gananoque, was won, first class, by Isis; second class, by Little Nell. A race around the club's course was won, first class, by Isis; second class, by Teppi.

A pleasant time was enjoyed at the L.Y.C.A. meet at Prinzer's Cove, the local yachts bringing home a goodly share of the prize money. On September 1st an enjoyable cruise to Cape Vincent was held with splendid results between the yachts of the Crescent Yacht Club and ours.

"Excellent motor boat races for a club championship cup and other prizes were held during the season, the championship cup being won by J. H. Sutherland's 'Charisma'.

"The dinghy races were not a success through lack of competitors. The club series were the only races in this class that were held, first prize being won by W. Nickle's 'Helen'.

Frank Smythe gave a report of the entertainment committee, showing that successful dances and various entertainments had been given during the year.

Commodore Waldron announced that he would make his customary donation of \$100 for prizes for the sailing classes.

After a vote of thanks to retiring officers, the meeting adjourned.

A POPULAR C.P.R. OFFICIAL

George Ham is Known the World Over

I first saw George H. Ham, ambassador-in-general and plenipotentiary extraordinary of the president of the Canadian Pacific Railway company, in Winnipeg, after the conclusion of the Bitter rebellion in 1885, and next in the press gallery at Ottawa, in the session of 1890, when he was representing the Manitoba Free Press in the fourth estate of parliament. A year later he took off his journalistic mantle, which he had worn for over thirty years, and became head of the publicity bureau of the big Canadian railway, a position which he held until last year, when he was promoted to the more dignified and less arduous post of special assistant to the president. "George" (nobody ever speaks of him as Mr. Ham) is probably the best known man in Canada. Any number of people who would not know Premier Borden if they saw him on the street (or for that matter, a majority of the public men of the country) know George, and they all love him. His acquaintance is as wide as the dominion, nay, as broad as the earth itself, because there is not a civilized nation which has not, at some time since 1891, had a representative who has enjoyed the acquaintance of the genial George. Although not a newspaper man in the direct sense of the word, for twenty-three years, George is still, always has been, and always will be, an honorary, and honored member of the fraternity. No press gathering, whether at Ottawa or elsewhere, is complete without the presence of George Ham, and no outing of the press women is a success unless they have with them their "daddy," whose wit is only equalled by his courtesy and whose carefulness as to the details of everything he undertakes is matched only by his extraordinary repertoire of stories, dealing with men and things, told only as he can. Like William Wainwright, of the Grand Trunk, George Ham has a store of reminiscences which the world would give much to read. Will it ever have the chance? I wonder, and am afraid not.

SAD CASE REVEALED IN POLICE COURT.

Baby Will be Placed in Home, and Three-Year-Old Boy Will Accompany Mother Who Will Secure Work on Vessel.

A young couple, separated after four years of married life, in which everything did not go along "as children, a bright-eyed youngster of three years, and a baby three months old, figured in the police court on Tuesday morning and presented a sad picture.

The husband, Gordon Byron, was accused of neglecting his children. The charge was laid by Rev. A. E. Smart, acting for the Children's Aid society. D. A. Givens appeared on behalf of Byron.

Mrs. Byron, in the witness box, stated that her husband abused her and that it was for this reason that she left him shortly after the birth of her baby in January last. She said her husband only worked part of the time.

Rev. Mr. Smart stated that the case had been brought before the court in order to get an order for the disposal of the two children. The mother stated that she had secured employment on a schooner running out of Kingston. She would arrange to take the three-year-old boy with her on the boat and place the baby in a local home. She was quite willing to support the two.

The children are at present with their grandparents but the grandfather stated that he was quite willing to let the mother have the children, and the court consented to the proposal of the mother. The court will keep an eye on the children in order to see that they are well cared for.

Rev. Mr. Smart, in his evidence, stated that Byron went around the city begging money from Protestant clergymen, stating that he had no money and that his family was starving. Witness gave the names of local clergymen who had given him money.

REVISION OF TARIFF FOR MANUFACTURERS.

who were the chief opponents of the imposition of the duty. However, it was found that the iron and steel man at Sydney and Hamilton took advantage of the duty to raise prices to the nail manufacturers. The government would take steps to remove the duty. There was also an increase in the duty on rolled iron and steel beams and other merchantable mill products, and some changes of relative less importance with regard to drawbacks to Canadian manufacturers on imported pig iron and bituminous coal imported by coke oven proprietors for foundry or metal-smelting purposes.

One of the most interesting of the tariff changes is the adoption of the tariff and United States legislation prohibition, after Jan. 1st next, the importation of cigarettes, osprey plumes and feathers, quills, wings or parts, either raw or manufactured, of wild birds. This prohibition, however, does not apply to ostrich, pheasant or peacock plumes, or the plumages of birds used as diet.

Other Interesting Items

Some of the other changes are as follows: On desiccated coconut the British preference is increased from two to three cents; amy alcohol, used for metal varnishes, is put on the free list; trade journals are allowed to bring in loose inserts of fashion plates, etc.; the duty on caustic soda and hyperchloride of lime is increased by 7 1/2 per cent under the British preference, and by 10 per cent, under the general tariff. There is a considerable list of jute cloth, yarns used for the manufacture of socks and stockings, and other items manufactured of woolen manufactures, which are included among the commodities on which a drawback of 99 per cent is allowed when manufactured into the finished product. In all there are some sixty changes, most of them of a minor character, in the seven hundred odd items in the present tariff schedules.

Revival of National Policy

Ottawa, April 7.—The general impression created from the budget speech delivered by Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance yesterday, is that the government intends to stand by the national policy, as in the past, and to make its next appeal to the people so far as the tariff is concerned, on the protectionist ticket. It is not considered here that the reduction made in the duties on binders and movers is to be taken as an indication of a tendency toward lower tariffs on the part of the government. This is practically the only item revised downward as announced by Mr. White and that minister has declared that in view of the high state of proficiency now reached by the manufacturers of these implements, and in view of the fact that they are exporting heavily, a reduction is justified, and in after all, not contrary to the principles of the national policy, which provides for "adequate" protection only.

It was arranged this morning that the budget debate will be proceeded with at once as several members on both sides of the house are desirous of being heard before the Easter adjournment. A. K. McLean, chief opposition financial critic, will commence the criticism of the minister of finance's statement shortly after three o'clock and will likely speak until six at least. He is expected to conclude with a motion calling for free wheat and free agricultural implements.

WHEN \$9,000 MORE STOCK IS SUBSCRIBED HERE.

Reliance Moulding Company Will be Aided by the Board of Trade in Getting the Balance of Capital Required.

A meeting of the Bureau of Industry and Information and the members of the council of the Board of Trade, with representatives of the Reliance Moulding Co., Ltd., was held in the Board of Trade rooms on Monday afternoon.

The representatives of the company stated that final arrangements had been made for the moving of the company's business to the site granted by the city provided \$25,000 worth of preferred stock could be disposed of in Kingston. It was proposed to sell \$25,000 worth of preferred stock with a bonus of fifty per cent of common stock, this stock to be sold under an agreement that the full amount of \$25,000 which was to be used for the erection of a factory building on the site given by the city. It was stated that \$16,000 of this preferred stock had been subscribed. The company wished the assistance of the Bureau and the Board of Trade in effecting the sale of the balance, \$9,000.

A financial statement was submitted which was fully considered by the meeting. After a general discussion a resolution was passed to the effect that the meeting approve of the company's proposition and recommend it to the support of all who can subscribe for the company's stock. It was felt that the business would be a profitable one and that the citizens should make a determined effort to raise the \$9,000 required for the erection of the buildings.

Ald. Fair, chairman of the Bureau of Industry and Information, was in the chair, and also present were Messrs. George Dawden, J. M. Campbell, T. F. Harrison, J. O. Hutton, Robert Meek, John Donnelly, J. S. R. McCann, H. C. Nickle, F. R. Phillips, of the Reliance Moulding company, Dr. A. W. Richardson and H. E. Richardson.
