THE SPORT REVIEW

THE MCGILL RUGBY CLUB WILL LOSE LEMAY

Ty Cobb Aims to Bat .500 This Season—Winnipeg to Have a Big Athletic Club
"Eddie" Phelps, the former Toronto and Brooklyn catcher, has taken the management of the Albany team in the New York state league. The Western Ontario Cricket League has decided to increase the number of balls in an over from six to eight. Guelph, Berlin, Waterloo, Brantford, Paris, Stratford, and Galt comprise the league.

J. M. Cameron, of the Athletic Incessive club of St. Catharines, is not in favor of granting permission to that club to play Sunday games in the United States. Mr. Cameron is opposed to such a scheme and had no part in suggesting it.

If the managers of the American baseball league clubs realize their hopes, there will be no such thing as a second division this season. Every team "will be up among the hat four all during the race," is the way they put it.

"Joe" Jackson met Ty Cobb in Chattanooga the other day, and told Ty that he would beat him in the race for the American league batting honors. Cobb replied that if he did he would have to hit .500. The Detroit star has his over .450, but has never equalled Hugh Duffy's record of .479.

The match between Cornwall and Montreal for the championship of the N.L.U. postponed from last autumn will be played off on Victoria Day, May 24th, in Montreal.

Ontario News: Just when we are getting ready for baseball and lacrosse the intercollegiate rugby union meets at Kingston and draws up a schedule. These college boys want to be in the limelight all the time.

Winnipeg is to have a new athletic organization known as the Winnipeg Athletic club, which will erect a building at a cost of about \$750,000 if the plans of ex-Mayor Waugh and several other prominent Winnipeg sportsmen materialize.

Although the McGill rugby team has suffered a number of unexpected losses since the close of last season, one of the most severe came yesterday when it was announced that Lemay, the husky middle wing player, would not turn out with the champions next fall. At the present time Lemay stands firm in his decision not to turn out again, and unless he can be prevailed upon by Coach Shaughnessy, McGill will have to find another man to take his place on the line.

CO-OPERATIVE STORES
For Oxford Students—Scheme Similar to That Tried in Dublin
London, April 8.—Stores on purely co-operative lines and managed by members of Oxford university will be opened next term at Oxford. They will be run on similar lines with the Co-operative society started by Dublin university last October and which proved a great success. Lord Shaftesbury and Sir Horace Plunkett, the great authority on co-operation, are members of the council. The management of the stores will be in the hands of five seniors and twenty juniors of the university, so the principal burden of executive work will rest with the undergraduates themselves, from which the idea sprang.

As at Dublin, the stores will begin by stocking groceries, tobacco and similar commodities. The ambition of those responsible for the scheme is first of all to teach the main principles of co-operation by practical experience of its advantages. Principal among these will be less expensive foods and the distribution of the profits among those who support the stores. It is hoped also that the stores will deal a blow at the credit system in vogue at the universities, which is a direct temptation to members to run up heavy bills, out of all proportion to their allowances.

CURED OF TONGUE CANCER
Gelvin Who Owes His Life to Radium
Denver, April 8.—Declaring that he had finally meant to take his own life if radium had failed to cure him, Franklin Pierce Gelvin, a prominent Denver man, just returned from Johns Hopkins hospital in Baltimore, told of what he pronounced, on the authority of his physicians, to be the most effective treatment for cancer thus far experienced.

Mr. Gelvin is sixty-two years old. In addition to being cured of cancer, he says he was cured of deafness and catarrh, ailments which had not been succeeded by his cancer. He declares he returns to his family, a wife and daughter, as vigorous and healthy as he was at twenty-five.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Union Stock Yards, Toronto, April 6.—Receipts were light, 48 cars, 703 cattle, 875 hogs, 46 sheep and lambs, 121 calves.

Cattle—The cattle trade was active owing to the light receipts and prices 15c to 25c per cwt. higher than the close of last week. Choice butcher's steers, \$8.00 to \$8.40; good butcher's steers, \$7.75 to \$8.00; medium butcher's steers, \$7.25 to \$7.60; common butcher's steers, \$6.90 to \$7.15; choice butchers' heifers, \$7.75 to \$8.00; common butcher's heifers, \$7.25 to \$7.50; \$8.00; choice cows, \$6.75 to \$7.25; good cows, \$6.00 to \$6.50; canners, \$3.50 to \$4.75; bulls, \$6.00 to 7.50.

Feeders and stockers—Not many offered and market firm. Choice steers, 7.00 to 7.25; medium steers, \$6.50 to \$6.75; stockers, \$5.75 to \$6.25.

Milkers and springers—Not many on the market at \$60. to \$85; each bulk sold at \$70 to \$75.

Calves—Market firm. Choice veals \$10.50 to \$11.00; common to medium, \$6.50 to \$9.

Sheep and lambs—Market as strong as ever. Spring lambs are being offered in small numbers selling from \$6.00 to \$9.85 each. Sheep, \$6.50 to \$7.50; culled and rams, \$4.50 to \$6.25; lambs, choice ewes and wethers, \$9.00 to \$9.85.

Hogs—Receipts light and prices firm. Selected, fed and watered \$9.25 and \$9.00 f. o. b. cars, and \$9.50 to \$9.50 weighed off cars.

Montreal Live Stock

Montreal, April 6.—(West end market)—cattle, receipts about 1,200; calves, 600; sheep and lambs, 75; hogs, 1,700.

Trade good without any material change in prices, quality considered. A few choice Easter heaves sold at 3-4c to 9c, while prime brought 7-8c to 8-12c; medium, 5-12c common, 4-12c to 5-12c.

Calves, 3-12c to 8c. Sheep, 6c to 1-2c. Lambs, 8-12c to 9c. Hogs, 9-3-4c to 10c.

Four carloads of north-west cattle were sold at from 7c to 8-1-4c.

CHINA IS PROTESTING

AGAINST THE BILL TO EXCLUDE WHITE GIRLS

From Oriental Restaurants—Asks That it be Held Over Till Constitutionality is Decided
Toronto, April 8.—Complaint has been made on behalf of the Chinese government of the clause in a bill to amend the factory act brought in by Hon. James S. Duff, prohibiting the employment of white girls by orientals in restaurants. This complaint, which comes through Yang Shu Wen, Chinese consul-general for Canada at Ottawa, and G. F. Ferguson, K.C., also of that city, pointed out that an appeal with respect to similar legislation passed by the legislature of Saskatchewan is now pending before the imperial privy council, the supreme court of the province and the supreme court of Canada both deciding the question of the constitutionality of the law in favor of the province.

Yang Shu Wen asked that the measure now before the legislature be allowed to stand until the decision of the privy council is known. He also pointed out that the bill might interfere with the rights conferred on Japanese by the existing treaty between Great Britain and Japan. Then there was a treaty pending between Canada and China, which had been negotiated by Hon. George E. Foster, minister of trade and commerce. It is likely that the progress of this legislation will be stayed until the privy council reaches a decision. In the meantime it is suggested that an amendment be made to the municipal act empowering factory inspectors or chiefs of police to pass judgment upon the fitness of orientals to employ white girls before consenting to such employment.

EDISON WANTS GOOD CHEW

Sends to "Red Kelly," for Some of Right Tobacco
West Orange, April 8.—Although he had written to the heads of the departments at his works here that he could be home yesterday, Thomas A. Edison has been prevailed upon by his wife to remain at his winter home at Fort Meyer, Fla., until April 16th.

"The missus just won't let me get back to work," the inventor wrote. "Some men might get sick and tired of work, but as the boy in the office says, 'believe me, I'm tired of being idle.' It's eating and sleeping and walking around. If this satisfies any able-bodied, active-minded man, some one ought to put him up as the woman suffrage candidate for president."

Lack of work is not all that annoys Mr. Edison. He can't get just the kind of tobacco that he wants in Florida, so he has written to William H. Meadowcroft, his private secretary, to "get Red Kelly" in building 18 and send it down to me in a hurry." He also sends his compliments to "Red," saying that he knows a good chew.

Many Needlessly Blind

Washington, April 8.—Of the 100,000 sightless persons in the United States, 40,000 are needlessly blind, in the opinion of many men who devote their lives to caring for the sightless. For that reason the most important discussion to be had before the first national conference of workers for the blind, which opens here on April 16th, will be on the prevention of blindness. The conference will last three days.

WARNED CLERICALS

FRENCH CABINET PLACARDED COUNTRY WITH MAN'S WORDS

He Accused the Roman Catholic Church of Teaching That Which Produced Factionalism
Paris, April 8.—One of the most significant recent speeches in the chamber of deputies which was almost unrecorded by the press on account of the Caillaux affair is now receiving wide attention because of the senate order to have it publicly posted throughout France.

It was the minister of public instruction, M. Vivian, in defense of the lay schools. In this he savagely attacked the clerical party amid the cheers of deputies. It was the first public posting of any speech since M. Briand's sensational utterance on the law of separation in December, 1908.

M. Vivian, whose speech is regarded as a statement of the present government's attitude toward the Roman Catholic church, said: "You, clericals, in the confessional schools set yourselves to destroy the sovereign principles on which the present regime is founded. You seek to implant in the souls of children irreparable misunderstandings, destined to cleave our country into factions."

"What is our aim in teaching? Our aim is to teach tolerance, and that all convictions ought to be respected so long as they are sincere, whether rooted in reason, the heart, or in the intellect.

"We make no appeal to Divine inspiration, neither in promising honours to the sweets of Paradise nor in worrying them with the darkness of hell. Our principle is that humanity ought to win its own salvation by toil and suffering.

"If the church brought us only her belief, her peace, her benediction to the dead, her consolation to the living, we would not distress ourselves about her. But she wishes to be the government and to conquer. She wishes to reconquer the prerogatives torn from her by the republic, to bring force into the service of the faith.

"Well, then, I say that if there is a regime that ought to face her it is the republican regime, for the republic also has a faith whose task is the uplifting of men's souls.

"I reply to your challenge, as declared by yourselves as children of the church, soldiers of the pope: You may well repeat the saying Montaigne said: 'Descendants of the crusaders will not give way before the children of Voltaire.'

"So then I say to you: 'Descendants of the revolution will not allow a renewal of the heaviest tyranny that ever existed.'
