

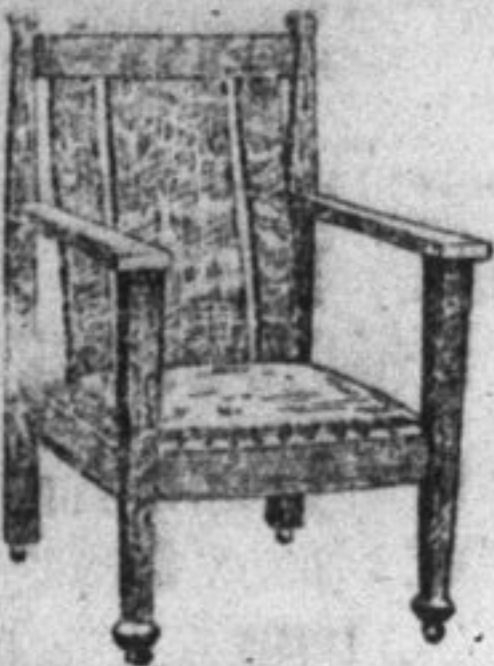


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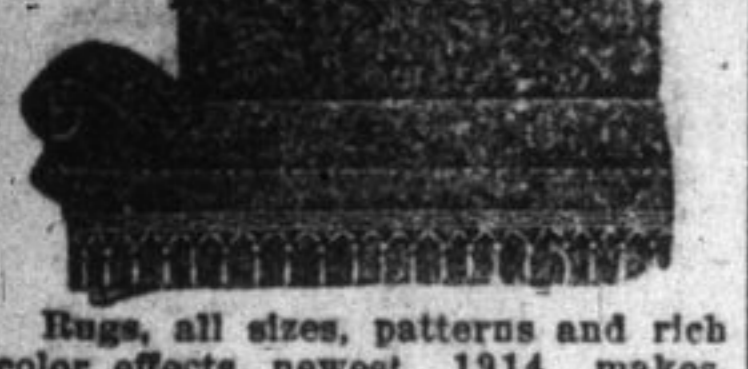

STOLEN BRASS FOUND

WAS TAKEN TWO WEEKS AGO OFF A STEAMER

Disposed of at Local Shop and the Police are Now Making Further Investigation—Wholesale Thefts of Brass During Winter.

Police Constable James Craig unearthed a quantity of stolen brass valued at \$50, while one his rounds on Wednesday, and it is now at the police station.

A portion of the brass has been identified as belonging to the steamer John Duncan, which is in port. The theft from this steamer was reported to the police two weeks ago, and ever since an effort has been made to locate it. It appears that the brass was disposed of at a local shop. Constable Craig noticed the brass in the shop, and believing that it might be some of the brass reported missing off the vessel, he made a thorough investigation, with the result that it was found that some of it had been taken from the vessel in question. The captain of the steamer called at the police station, on Thursday morning, and identified it.

The theft of the brass put the captain of the boat to a great deal of inconvenience, owing to the fact that the vessel was being fitted out for the summer. As a result, some new plates had to be ordered, and they are now being made, all of which means extra expense in addition to the inconvenience.

It would appear as if there has been quite an organized gang at work in the city this last winter, stealing brass, as it will be remembered that just a short time ago Constable Bateson discovered two tons of it and all was identified as having been stolen. One man is now serving time in Central prison, having been found guilty of stealing brass.

Considerable Later.

The chances are that the first boat from Kingston to reach Cape Vincent, N. Y., writes a correspondent, will be as late this season as it was two years ago. ANOTHER TO RETIRE

FROM THE R.M.C. CIVIL STAFF IN JUNE.

Prof. W. R. Butler's Position Offered to Prof. Alexander Macphail, of Queen's—Two Military Professors Also Retire.

The Royal Military College, at the close of the present term in June, will lose another member of the civil staff in the person of Prof. W. R. Butler, M.A., who has been head of the civil engineering and architecture department since Sept. 1st, 1897.

Prof. Butler, as well as Prof. J. B. Cochran, is to be retired. Both of these members of the college staff will receive gratuities. Prof. Butler came to the Royal Military College from King's College, Windsor, N.S., being appointed by the ex-minister of militia, Sir Frederick Borden.

It is understood that the position to be vacated by Prof. Butler has been offered to Prof. Alexander Macphail, of Queen's School of Mining. The initial salary is \$2,900, with a maximum of \$3,500. Prof. Butler is receiving \$3,100 a year, the same as Prof. Cochran. Prof. Macphail has the offer under consideration.

The professorship held by Prof. Cochran was offered to Prof. L. J. Cattanach, of Queen's School of Mining, but it is understood that he declined.

The terms of two members of the military staff are up at the close of this session, viz.: Major A. J. Wolff, R.E., professor of civil surveying and astronomy, and Capt. R. C. Hammond, R.L., professor of military engineering.

THE LATE JOSEPH GORRIE Well-Known Resident Died on Thursday Morning.

Joseph Gorrie, 643 Princess street, died on Thursday morning about one o'clock, at his residence.

He was born in Scotland, about sixty-nine years ago, and came to this country as a boy. He farmed for many years in the township of Kingston and was a member of the county council for some years. For the last eight months he has been in charge of the city weigh scales at the hay market.

He had been troubled with diabetes for some time and this, coupled with an attack of pneumonia, brought about his death. His third wife and eleven children (eight sons and three daughters) survive. The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon. Capt. Smith, of the Salvation Army, will be in charge of the service.
