CITY PROPERTY COMMITTEE OPPOSED TO SELLING

May be Less Next Winter

The City Property Committee yesterday afternoon decided that it would not part with the fair grounds. It had before it a reference from the City Council regarding the matter, Ald. Sutherland having offered the council an option he had on the Cataraqui driving park in Williamsville, for \$9,000. The proposition was to sell the present fair grounds by dividing them into building lots, and purchase the driving park for exhibition purposes.

The Property Committee did not take long to come to a decision. Ald. Harrison, the chairman, said that it would probably take \$70,000 to put the Williamsville grounds into condition for fair purposes.

"Let us keep the present grounds, they are good enough," said Ald. Clugston.

"We have an opportunity of getting a fair at present, which will grow gradually into something larger, and I think we should encourage it," said Ald. Harrison, who expressed the opinion that the people would not vote \$70,000 for fair grounds buildings. "I think," he said. "that we should adopt the English idea of what we have we'll hold."

Alds. Richardson and White concurred in the idea of retaining the present grounds, while Ald. Peters. who stepped into the committee room from the Board of Works meeting, advised the property members not to sell unless the proposed new grounds were to be put into shape. Any way, the city could not stand the April 29th. expense, he said.

A resolution was passed , to the effect that no action be taken on the proposition to sell the grounds.

C. F. Winter, military secretary, stated that the smaller portion of the property is being continued under lease to Lady Cartwright, who at present holds a ninety-nine year lease from 1904. The larger portion of the 125 acres in rear of the point, is being taken over by the militia department from the 1st of April, 1914. Thus there is little chance of the city get-
