**DR. GENGE, OF VERONA
WRITES ABOUT THE FLOODING
OF LANDS.**

In that District—He suggests that
the Members of These Constitu-
encies Should Demand Redress
From the Legislature.

Verona, April 8.—(To the Edi-
tor)—This would appear to be an
appropriate time to again discuss
the subject of the high water here.
This is the season when the roads
are overflown and travelling is in-
terfered with, and also when lands
that were dry enough to be plowed
last autumn are covered with water
to remain so probably until the late
of next crop sown on them. The
road through Kingston's swamp is
virtually impassable. Likewise the
long bridge between Bell Rock and

logs out of Petworth dam, the logs
