

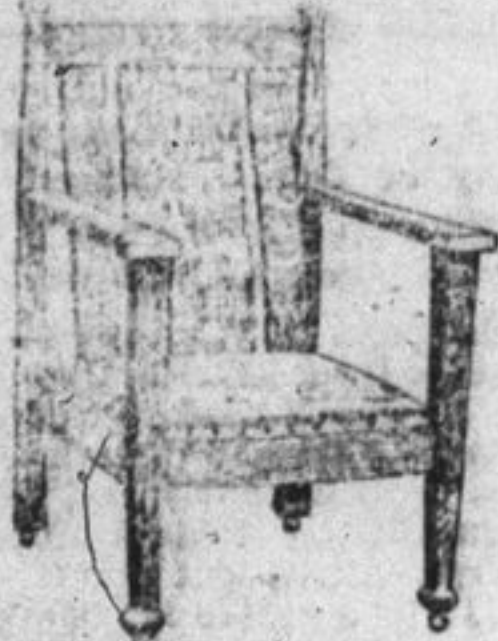


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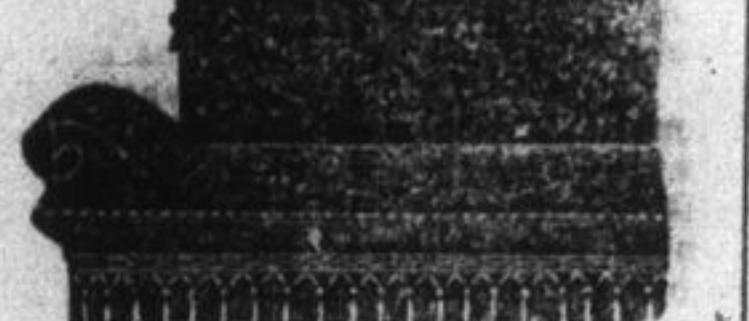

A SIX TEAM LEAGUE

THE CITY BASEBALL LEAGUE ARRANGES SERIES

C. L. C. Will Not Enter—The Athletics, Victorias and Ponies Will be the Senior Teams.

The City Baseball league will be composed of six teams, three junior and three senior. This was the decision of the executive which met Wednesday evening in the Y. M. C. A. building. The senior series will be composed of Victorias, Athletics and Ponies. The management of the C. L. C. baseball team decided not to enter, and for that reason the Ponies were asked to take the jump into senior ranks. It was decided that the Victorias and Athletics would be matched in the opening game of the series which will likely take place on Saturday, May 16th or 23rd, at the cricket field.

Up until the present time it is doubtful what junior teams will apply for admission. At the meeting on Wednesday evening four teams expressed their desire to enter, but the executive feels that a three-team schedule would be far more satisfactory. The clubs were given their certificates which must be signed before the next meeting. It is expected that Sapolios, Parkine and Ponies will compose the series. If the Regiopolis club signs up sufficient players and one of the other teams fall to sign up enough players then the Regiopolis club will be taken in. The management of the Ponies baseball club intends running both senior and the junior teams. There is a possibility that the club will be forced to call upon some of the players who formerly wore the C. L. C. uniform. Stanley Trotter, president of the league, presided at the meeting.

HAD TO PAY A FINE

FOR DRIVING PIG ON WRONG SIDE OF STREET. Practice Dangerous and Expensive—First Appearance Drunk Claimed That He Had Been "Doped."—Stolen Brass Recovered.

It does not pay to drive on the wrong side of the street. Not only is it dangerous, but it is also expensive. Clement Letaver, a driver, made his second appearance in the police court within a very short time, on Thursday morning, charged with a violation of the city by-law. The first time he was given a chance, but his second time cost him a fine of \$3 and costs or twenty days, or a total of \$5.55.

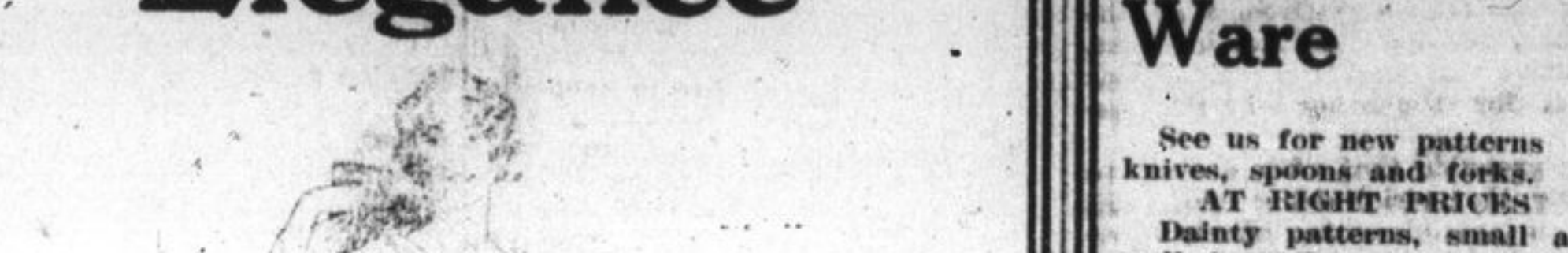

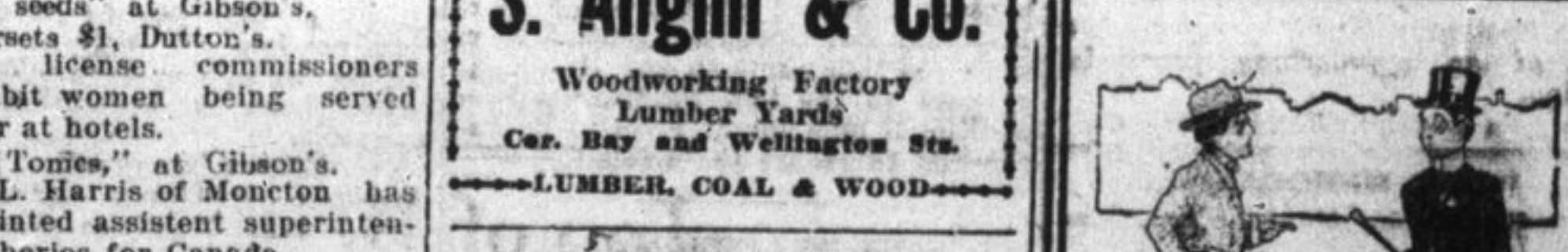
