

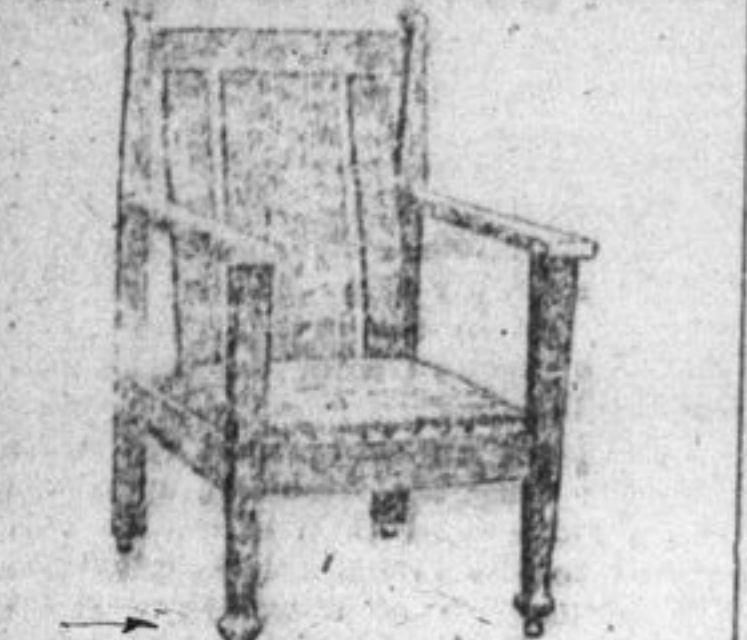

RELEASED ON PAROLE

Earl W. Redmond Given a Term in Central Prison - Earl W. Redmond, who pleaded guilty to a charge of theft, in the sensational express robbery at Sharbot Lake, a year ago, and who was given two years, less one day, in Central Prison, by Magistrate Farrell, has been released on parole.

The theft, it will be remembered, caused quite a sensation. The amount involved, over \$1,000, was stolen while it was being transferred from one county to another at Sharbot Lake. Redmond, who was employed as a messenger for the Dominion Express company, was arrested by Detective Pinchen, of the C.P.R., and admitted stealing the money. He was sentenced on March 22nd, 1913.

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL

Notified That Fallon Bros. Will Live Up to Fair Wage Scale - At a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council, on Thursday night, a letter was received from Fallon Bros., having the construction of the causeway, in which they agreed to live up to the fair wage scale.

A resolution was passed opposing the granting of an increase in salary for the fire chief, and decided to forward a communication to the council protesting against an increase for the head of the city's fire department.

WOMAN ALMOST SUFFOCATED IN MUD ON ROADWAY.

Was Gathered in by the Police and Found to be Member of the "Prohibited List." - Other Cases in the Police Court.

Edith Willis, a middle-aged woman, came within an ace of being suffocated on Thursday evening. While under the influence of liquor she fell on her face in the mud on Place de Armes and was rescued by some of the people living in that neighborhood and afterwards removed to the police station by Constable Jenkins, who was called. The woman was in a sad plight. She trembled from head to foot, and her clothing was spattered in mud. She presented a sad picture when arraigned in the police court Friday morning.

The accused had a double charge to face, as she is a member of the "prohibited list." She told the magistrate she was very sorry. Questioned by the court, she told of having paid a call to see a friend on Ontario street, during Thursday afternoon, and it was here that she was served with the liquor. "But I only had a very little," she explained, whereupon the magistrate told her that she was in an awful condition for having taken only a very small quantity.

The magistrate pressed her, as to whether she had been given liquor at any other place other than at her friend's house, but she declared that all she received was given her by her friend.

"My friend is not to blame," added the accused, who did not care to have others mixed up in her trouble. After questioning the unfortunate woman about the little drinking party, the magistrate remanded her until Monday.

Frederick Ormiston comes before the magistrate every little while, on a charge of being drunk. He had a little speech all ready to give the magistrate about getting another chance, but the court cut him off short with a fine of \$2 and costs or twenty days.

"You have had too many chances now," said the magistrate. Michael Hart, an "alco drunk," desired a chance to "make good." He will have the chance. If he coveys a fine of \$1 and costs. He too, wanted time to pay his fine, and the court informed him that this would be decided later.

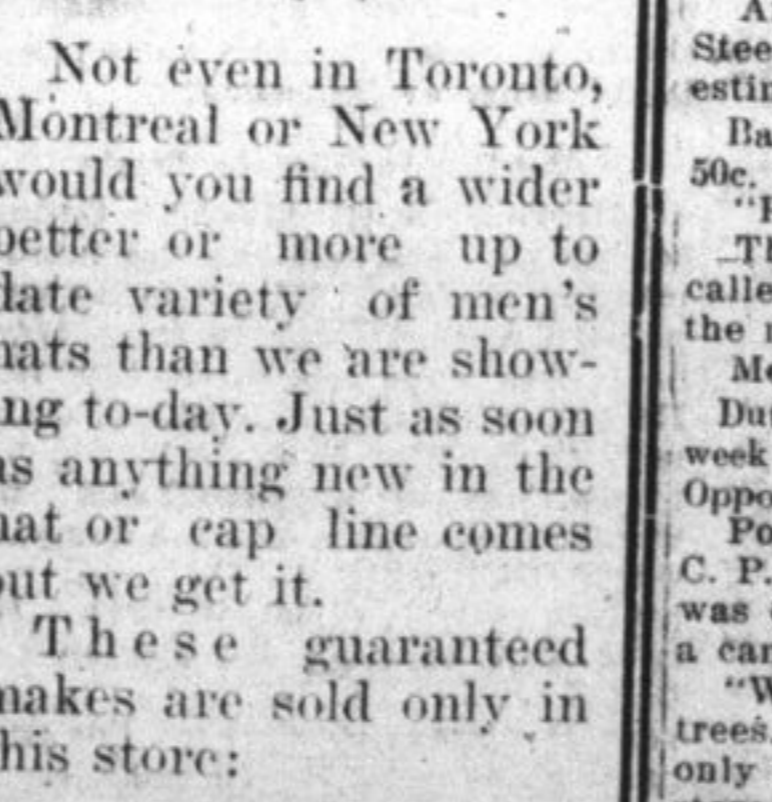
