BURST THE THERMOMETER
Fever Patient in Kiev Hospital Makes Record of 131 Degrees
Kiev, April 16.—A temperature which amazed the doctors and broke the thermometer is recorded in the case of a girl patient in one of the Kiev hospitals.
She is suffering from typhus fever and her case attracted special attention when a temperature of 112 degrees Fahrenheit was recorded, bursting the thermometer.
In the presence of a number of professors and students her temperature was taken with a special instrument, which showed 122 degrees, later rising to 131 degrees. The facts are vouched for by the eminent physicians Observator Janowski. According to all previous experience, life at such a temperature is unknown, even impossible.



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
