TOWN OF GANANOQUE

DEATH OF MRS. ELIZA RANEY KEHNAHAN.
At the Age of Eighty-two — The Easter Vestry Meeting of Christ Anglican Church.

Gananoque, April 18.—Eliza Raney, relict of the late William Kehnan, of this town, passed away at the family residence, Brock street, yesterday, in the eighty-second year of her age. Deceased was one of the pioneer residents of this section, being the eldest daughter of the late Mrs. John Sheppard, of Gananoque, and was widely known and held in high esteem. She was predeceased by her husband about a year ago, and leaves two sons, Robert and George, both residents of this town, and also two daughters, Mary, wife of Mr. Kelly, of Swift Current, Sask., and Miss Catherine Kehnan, of Watertown, N.Y. Ex-Mayor Robert Sheppard and Mrs. William Pratt, King street, are half-brother and sister of deceased, as are also Mrs. William Wooton, Schenectady, N.Y., and Messrs. S. Sheppard, of Minto, Man., and William Sheppard, Lamesboro, N.S. The funeral will be held on Monday morning to Olivet burying ground, in the northern part of the township. Rev. Walter Cox, rector of Christ church, will conduct the service.

The funeral of the late Eliza Jane Day took place yesterday afternoon, from the residence of her son, Samuel Day, Front of Leeds township, to St. Andrew's church, where Rev. Henry Grey performed the last rites of the Presbyterian church, of which she was a member, and her remains were laid to rest in Gananoque cemetery.

The ladies of the Orange Benevolent Association held an old-fashioned sugar social in their lodge room last evening, and drew out quite a large crowd. A programme of a musical and literary nature was rendered.

The Easter vestry meeting of the congregation of Christ church was held on Wednesday evening, and was quite largely attended. The financial report was of an exceptionally satisfactory nature, as with an extra expenditure of about \$500 the receipts exceeded the expenditure by upwards of \$65. Among other business coming up, the question of enlarging the parish house, which has become too small to accommodate the Sunday school and other church functions, was given a thorough discussion, which will probably materialize later on in the season. These officers were elected: Rector, warden, Dr. G. H. Bird; people's warden, George L. Johnston; secretary-treasurer, C. V. Ketchum; synod representative, George L. Johnston; auditors, W. H. Britton and A. D. Howe.

The coal schooner Horace Taber, which was wintered in Gananoque river, and which has been undergoing repairs for the past few weeks, was pulled out to the Rathbun wharf, yesterday, where she will be refitted at once ready for the opening of navigation here.

The contract for the new high school at Winchester has been let to Messrs. Hehner and Winstanley, of Morrisburg. The price is \$13,200. The building is to be completed and ready for occupation by the first day of September next.
