SPAIN NOT SATISFIED
Demands Safe Return of Her Subjects to Torreon
Washington, April 17.—Senor Riano, the Spanish ambassador, who was among Secretary Bryan's callers yesterday, again pressed the claims for redress of the seven hundred Spanish subjects expelled by General Villa from Torreon. He had been informed by Secretary Bryan of General Carranza's decision to act upon representations made by the United States on behalf of foreigners in Mexico. But the Madrid government is not satisfied merely with a promise that future claims of Spanish subjects may be made through the United States. It wants a safe return for the Spanish exiles now at El Paso to their former homes in Torreon. Mr. Bryan is continuing negotiations with General Carranza regarding arrangements for the return of all the exiles not held guilty of being active supporters of the Huerta government.

FOR REAL BIRD FLIGHTS
New Type of Flying Machine Described in Paris
Paris, April 18.—A new type of flying machine, the object of which is to enable a man to imitate birds in utilizing the wind to the exclusion of other motive power, was described to-night at the congress of the Society of Savants. The invention is that of Dr. A. Magnan and the flight it is intended to make is a kind of a continuous volplane. After the manner of large birds the apparatus is provided with a spreading tail and two tapering wings, the wings being so placed as to enable it to remain motionless. The control of the machine must be acquired by practice, as in the case of a bicycle, but it is admitted, this will present great difficulties and even dangers.
