AGRICULTURAL TOPICS FOR WHIG READERS

The first three months of the year are usually the most trying of the whole of the twelve, and if strong chickens are to be hatched in due course, housing must be on right lines. There must be adequate shelter, or else that may have been done for their benefit will be seriously minimized. The feeding may be all that the most advanced student could advocate, each element just in its correct ratio, yet it will be of small avail unless the housing is on equally sound lines. If the house is cold and draughty, the inmates naturally require more heat, which, if assisted by proper housing, is extracted from the food; thus much of the surplus that would go to promote egg-production is used in another direction. In addition to comfortable sleeping quarters, a shelter is necessary. This need not be an expensive erection, merely something that will fulfill the function of providing protection during the day-time.—E. T. Brown, in "Farm and Home."

Selection of Eggs is Important
The best hens to breed from are the active, bright-eyed and good laying birds when they know that some of eggs with strong fertility. The poor emaciated hen will produce weaklings. The hen deformed from birth will be likely to produce deformed chicks. Be sure to have your breeding pen composed of the best of your stock. If you have quite a number of birds from which to make a selection of a breeding pen, choose carefully and do not breed from all of the birds. Some breeders do not seem to think that they should make careful selection in this way, but will use the eggs from all the birds when they know that some of them are very inferior specimens. Careful selection means better birds and fewer culls the next year.

Seed Potatoes in U.S.
"Good Seed Potatoes and How to Produce Them," is the subject of a bulletin from the United States department of agriculture. In this review of potato culture it is pointed out that farmers in the United States are practically at the same point in regard to yield per acre as were their forefathers. In the five years 1865-1872 the average yield per acre was only slightly less than that in the like period 1908-1912, and for the years 1891 to 1910 inclusive, was less than half that of Germany and Great Britain.

Of the many causes operating to produce a low average yield in America, the use of poor "seed" is thought to be an important one. In the first place too little attention is paid to the purity of the stock; furthermore, the custom of planting small tubers is said to be dangerous, as tending to the planting of the produce of potatoes suffering from "curly dwarf" (leaf-curl). The use of immature seed is advised, and growers are also recommended to grow for seed, plots of specially selected tubers. It is believed that the average potato production of the United States would be materially increased if a more liberal allowance of seed was planted; at present this is, on the average, about one-third of the weight per acre planted in the United Kingdom.

High Prices for Shire Horses
The King gave 300 guineas (\$1,575), for Sir Berkeley Sheffield's eight year old shire mare Lady Portester, a daughter of the famous Lockinge Forest King, at a sale held at Peterborough, Eng., by Messrs. Sexton, Grimwade and Beck. The sensation of the sale was a bid of Lord Rothschild's of 600 guineas.

POULTRY BUSINESS

GOOD REVENUE RECEIVED FROM A SMALL FLOCK

Eggs Should Be From a Carefully Selected Stock and Coop Should Be Kept Clean—Chicks Should Have Best of Food.

With 150 square feet of ground suitable for poultry, and devoting half an hour every eight and morning with an extra two or three hours on Saturday, you should be able to add \$200 or \$300 to your income. My authority for this is my knowledge of a bank clerk whose home is beyond the city limits, who made \$800 last year from a flock of 100 hens, and of a post-mistress who made \$462, though neither of them gave more than a few hours a week to poultry, so it seems safe to say that any one with ordinary common sense and industry can make \$300 or \$400. Any sort of old hens and coops won't do. A person who starts with very little capital will find it advisable to buy three good birds rather than twenty poor ones and make a clean, new house, even if it's only 3 by 6 feet, rather than patch up some vermin infested shanty. This is the time to lay the foundation of winter eggs and next year's profits so if you have a flock of any of the popular breeds hatch every one. But, if your flock consists of mongrels, feed them well and get all the eggs you can, sell them for table use with the proceeds buy eggs from some reliable dealer, or, what is better, sell a few old birds and buy a small incubator. There is a good little metal machine costing \$6 which holds fifty eggs. Fearless brooders from the same firm cost the same. Chicks should have nothing to eat for 43 hours after leaving the shell. The reason is the yolk is absorbed immediately before a chick breaks through the shell and must be allowed time to digest and pass through the bowels before any foreign substance is introduced or

Notes of Interest
Unless prompt precautions are taken in the spring, the leaves of fruit trees and bushes are liable to become heavily infested with plant lice. The remedy for these insects is to spray with either the well-known kerosene emulsion or whale oil soap, one pound in five gallons of water. If the spray is done early in the season, when the insects are first observed, the best results will be obtained.

The United States department of agriculture recommends the lime-sulphur wash as having given thoroughly satisfactory results. This wash consists of: Unsifted lime, 20 lbs.; flowers of sulphur, 15 lbs.; water, 50 gallons. The lime, sulphur, and one-third of the water are boiled together for one hour, and then the rest of the water is added. By adding salt to the wash it will stick better. This wash may be readily applied with an ordinary spray machine. Where a large number of trees are growing in a nursery this will mean a considerable saving of time.

That the agitation for a fat stock show for London, to be held during the winter months, is meeting with the unanimous approval of the big breeders throughout western Ontario is shown by communications received by Industrial Commissioner Gordon Phillip. The fact that London is situated in the heart of the most successful cattle-raising district of Ontario, is regarded as proof of its success.

Commercial chick feed is the best feed, being a mixture of seeds and finely broken corn, specially put up for chicks. Once a day give a little hot cheese or stale bread soaked in milk and squeezed dry. When confined to brooders vegetable material must be added such as lettuce leaves or tops of green onions chopped fine. Keep clean water, ground charcoal and fine grit always before them and remember, with really good birds, your profits come in the spring from selling eggs for hatching or for day old chicks. Indeed you should not begrudge the utmost thought and care to your poultry in the growing stage, for it is then you are building the foundation for a profitable poultry plant.

CROCODILE EGGS CROAK
Young Species Made Audible Sound Within Shells.
The New York Sun.
That young unhatched crocodiles utter an audible croaking cry within the eggs in which they are laid is averred by knowledge, and it adds the cry to so loud and distinct that it can be heard when the eggs are buried in one or two yards of sand.
Dr. W. A. Lamborn has recently tested the fact at Lagos, on the West African coast. He heard a croaking noise from below a dry path and, digging in the path to investigate, the crocodile, he discovered thirteen crocodile's eggs at a depth of about eighteen inches. All the young crocodiles hatched out within half an hour of being dug up.
So far back as 1899 Dr. Voeltzkow noticed that unhatched Madagascar crocodiles uttered a cry from the egg at a depth of two yards and that any shock, as of a heavy tread near the eggs, caused the baby crocodiles to produce this sound "with the mouth closed, as we produce hiccup sounds." In this way they inform the female crocodile, when she visits the nest, that they want her aid, whereupon she scrapes the sand away and they emerge.
