HELD UP THE FIREMEN

ALD. GRAHAM'S AUTOMOBILE BECAME STALLED.

And Fire Apparatus Was Delayed for a Brief Period - Fire in Home of Mrs. Richardson Division Street.

While proceeding to a fire at the home of Mrs. L. Richardson, Division street, on Thursday afternoon, the members of the fire department were held up at corner of Division and Princess streets, as a result of an automobile driven by Ald. Graham, becoming stalled on the car track near that corner.

When the firemen were coming along Division street towards Princess street, Ald. Graham attempted to cross the street car track in his automobile, which "played up" and the firemen had to wait a short time until he was able to start the engine.

On account of excavation work, which is being carried on by the street railway company, there is only room on the corner of Princess and Division streets for one wagon to pass.

When the firemen arrived at the corner of Division and Garrett streets. Driver Cockade, who was driving the hose wagon, saw the automobile coming along the street and called for the driver to stop, but he evidently did not hear the call. The hose wagon and ladder truck had to be brought to a complete standstill until the automobile passed over the car track.

The fire, which was causing the trouble, started in one of the upper rooms of the home of Mrs. Richardson, near the corner of Queen and Division streets, as a result of a coal oil stove causing some trouble. Some little damage was done as result of the blaze. The people living in the house lost some time in sending in the alarm.

"LATE JAMES JOHNSON

Passed Away on Thursday Night After Brief Illness.

After being confined to his room for the past four days Ex-Ald. James Johnson died at his home on University avenue, on Thursday night, at 11.30 o'clock. Although the deceased had been troubled with his heart for some years it was not thought the end was so near. On Monday he was taken to bed with what he thought to be a bad cold, but the cold developed into pneumonia. On Thursday evening his condition became serious.

The late Mr. Johnson was a son of the late John Johnson, of the town of Storrington. When a young man he went in business in the country and conducted stores at Batterssea, Odessa, Glenora and Frankford. About twenty-five years ago he moved to the city. For many years he was in the boot and shoe business, at the corner of Bagot and Princess streets, but retired from that line and went into partnership in the dry goods business with Henry Crumley. When that partnership was dissolved Mr. Johnson conducted a dry goods business in the building now occupied by the Royal Bank on Wellington street. About three years ago he retired from business owing to ill-health.

In 1905 the late Mr. Johnson was a member of the city council as representative for Rideau ward. He was an alderman for one year. In politics he was a strong conservative. Deceased was a Methodist and member of Queen street church. He was a man of kind disposition, enterprising and progressive.

He is survived by his wife, one brother and three sisters. The sisters are Mrs. F. C. Hewton, Miss Sarah Johnson and Mrs. James McNamee, Ottawa. William Johnson, Inverary, is a brother.

The funeral will take place from his late residence on Monday morning, at ten o'clock, at Catarqui cemetery. Rev. G. I. Campbell, pastor of Queen street church, will conduct the service at the home.
