attack on Vera Cruz with reinforcements, and the possible necessity of a forward movement toward Mexico City, to protect fleeing Americans and the Vera Cruz railroad, were the underlying reasons for the military movement.

The restoration of the embargo on arms was officially announced after the pronouncement of General Carranza, the constitutional chief, that he regarded the seizure of Vera Cruz as a violation of Mexican sovereignty had been considered by the administration.

Seeks to Uphold U.S. Dignity Washington, April 24.—After an extended cabinet meeting to-day, President Wilson again emphasized the fact that the quarrel of the United States is not against Mexico but Huerta alone.

Americans Stabbed in Mexico London, April 24.—According to a cipher message received to-day by a big firm, two Americans were stabbed to death on the streets of Mexico City, and there is general rioting this afternoon.

BOARD OF HEALTH AWAITS

Decision of Police Commissioner Regarding P. C. Timmerman

Members of the Board of Health are anxiously awaiting the action of the police commissioners with regard to the request of the City Council that he be relieved of regular duty in order to become sanitary inspector.

At present the Board of Health has no one it can call upon at all times to perform sanitary duties, including fumigation of houses, etc.

The members are all satisfied that Police Constable Timmerman can fill the post to which he has been appointed by the council, and he is willing to undertake the duties, under the direction of the medical health officer.

The health board has arranged a big programme of work for the year, but whether it will be carried out or not will depend upon the release of Police Constable Timmerman from the force, for the commission has no money to expend for additional sanitary work this year.

As soon as the new inspector takes office the medical health officer and the board will be able to do something.

The prosecution of Mr. Rubin was a test case and was closely followed by all art lovers.

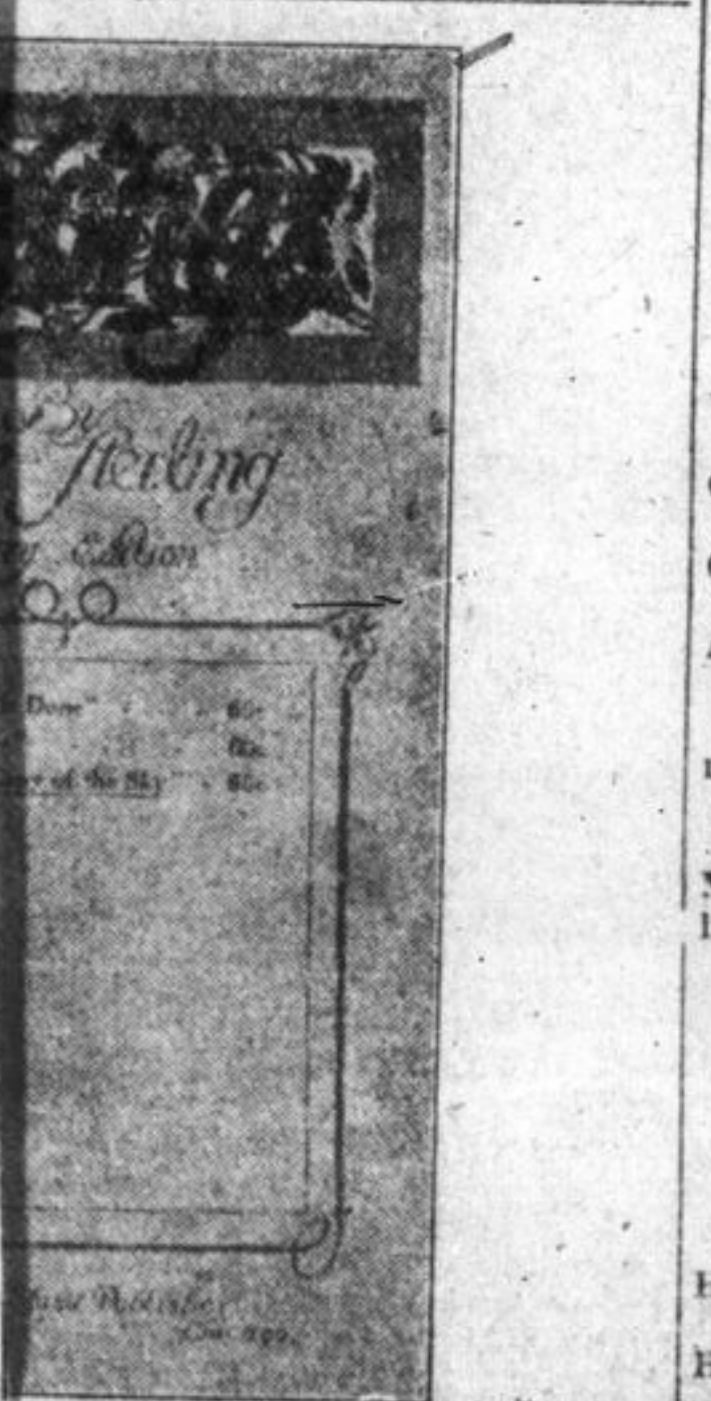
