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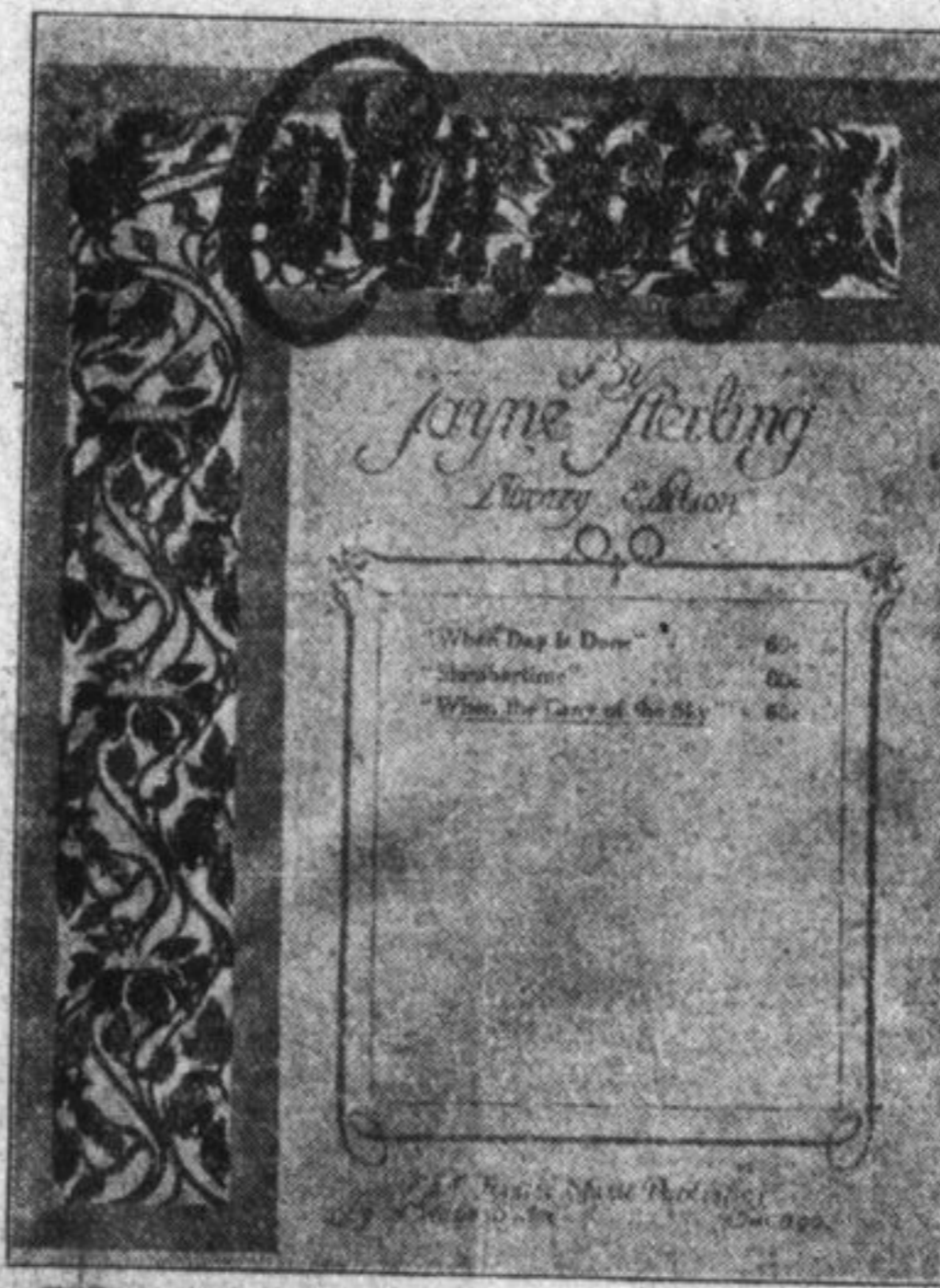

Headman's Sword May be Abolished in German States
Although there is no movement in Germany to do away with capital punishment, there is one in favor of substituting the gallows for the headman's sword employed in Prussia and several other German states.
The reformers contend that while it is almost impossible for anything

to go wrong with the gallows, guillotine, or electric chair it not infrequently happens that the headman "loses" his nerve and botches his job. It is also held that decapitation by the sword is far more gruesome than need be, and that the sight of the black-covered block and silent executioner leaning on his short broadsword is a far greater tax on a condemned man's nerves and courage than the scaffold or chair.
In Berlin the execution takes

place in the courtyard of the Ploetz penitentiary, in which the executioner awaits the arrival of the condemned man on a large flat stage, which gives him a firm footing. The culprit—after sentence has been read to him by one of the officials who are present, clad in evening dress—is thrown face downward on a sort of bench in which there is a cup-shaped hole for his head to rest in. He is then strapped down and the headman raises the sword of death up to his

own chin, and then lets the heavy, razor-edged blade swing down.
Possibly the reason that there has been no movement toward the abolition of this medieval form of execution lies in the fact that details of executions are never published in the German press. Moreover, as the death sentence is rarely carried out, the public does not often hear of the harrowing details of a Prussian or Saxon execution.

DUKE'S MANY GIFTS

Eight Recreation Grounds, a Park, and Checks.
A large number of generous gifts have been made by the Duke of Portland to celebrate his silver wedding and the coming of age of his eldest son, Lord Titchfield. His presents to Huddell, near Nottingham, alone amount to a value of about \$100,000, comprising as they do three recreation grounds in addition to Waddow Park,

which has an area of eleven acres. His grace has sent a check for \$1,250 to the Nottingham general hospital, while his gift to the town of Mansfield takes the form of a six-acre pleasure ground, at present leased by the town council from the duke. To Kerby-ingham he has offered to present three recreation grounds, and to Mansfield Woodhouse over thirteen acres, known as Xosman's Hill, to be kept as an open space for the benefit of the parish. The duke has also sent

checks to assist the local authorities to fence off the land.
Were Turned Back.
Two Italians who were endeavoring to cross the American border were turned back by the American immigration officer, on Thursday afternoon, when they were about to board the steamer America at Folger's wharf. They have only been in Canada about fifteen days, having landed at St. John, N.B.
