AN ADVENTUROUS CAREER

This Man's Life Story Reads Like a Dime Novel.

George Boucher was recently arrested in Paris. He was arrested as a deserter. When questioned he told his life history to the police. His story is more thrilling than ever the most thrilling nickle movie.

Boucher was born in the slums of Paris thirty years ago. He was deserted by his mother and adopted by wealthy people. He was kept in luxury until he was ten years old. He was indulged in every whim. Then the man of the family died and the woman married again. The new foster father did not take kindly to the boy. He was taken to an orphan asylum. A year later he was adopted by a woman in moderate circumstances. A year later she died. George became a stray waif. On the streets of Paris he met a gang of burglars. At thirteen he was a regular member of the gang. The years following were full of crime and adventures. He was sentenced seven times in France and four times in Belgium for various offences.

In 1905 George enlisted in the Fifth battalion, light infantry, stationed in Africa. Adventure followed. But George was not an obedient soldier and soon found his way to military prison.

In September, 1906, he escaped from prison and after a series of thrilling adventures returned to France. He was arrested the next year and taken to Marseilles, where he was lodged in the Fort St. Jean until he could be transferred to Algeria. While out for exercise he broke from his captors and flung himself from the battlement into the Mediterranean, over one hundred feet below. Striking out, Boucher gained the shore.

At length he was taken prisoner. Three months later, while he was awaiting his trial by court marshal he again escaped. This time no one knew just how he did it. This was in July, 1908. He returned to Paris, where he was arrested after more thrilling adventures, during which he posed as a Russian count.

Once more Boucher was taken to Africa. He burrowed his way through the ceiling of his cell and fled by way of the desert toward Tripoli. For three days he marched steadily under a burning sun. He had nothing to eat and only a little water to drink. He reached Tripoli and hid himself in a merchantman about to leave for Spain.

In Spain Boucher met a Spanish

widow of great beauty who wished to marry him, but he longed for Paris. As soon as he could he returned there. His recent arrest followed.

LONDON'S GOVERNMENT.

Lord Mayor Gets £10,000 a Year Which is Half What It Costs.

The municipal government of London consists of the London County Council, which is the chief authority, and of various borough councils, which generally have to do with purely local matters. The London County Council was established under the British local government act, 1888, superseding the Metropolitan Board of Works.

The administrative area of the county is 117 square miles. The council consists of 118 councillors, nineteen aldermen and a chairman (who is sometimes an alderman).

The councillors are elected for fifty-eight districts every three years, two members being returned for each section, with the exception of the city proper (that area about a mile square, in which are situated the Bank of England, the Royal Exchange, the Stock Exchange, the Mansion House and most of the principal financial and insurance institutions.) The aldermen are appointed by the council and they hold office for six years, nine or ten retiring each three years and are eligible for re-election.

The London County Council deals generally with matters which concern all the boroughs comprising Greater London, while the local borough councils have a certain authority—for example, over streets, buildings, drainage, etc.—such authority being confined to matters that concern the local borough rather than London proper.

Under the local government act of 1899 various bodies until then known as vestries, district boards and parish overseers ("outside the city") were abolished and the metropolitan borough council established in their place. There are twenty-eight of these bodies, each composed of from thirty to sixty councillors, who are triennially elected by the rate-payer; and in addition there are 227 aldermen (five or ten on each council) co-opted from within or without the council and whose term of service is six years.

There are no emoluments attached to the offices of councillors, either county or borough, nor to those of the borough mayor, nor aldermen. It is estimated that the lord mayor's salary of \$48,665 per annum is barely sufficient to cover half the cost of this term of office, the excess being defrayed by himself.

FORESHADOWED BY ANIMALS.

Cats, Cows, Sheep and Many Birds Reliable Barometers.

Cats fur is full of electricity, and before a thunderstorm a cat is always extremely fussy and playful, probably on account of its electrical condition. Before rain is expected you will see a cat assiduously washing its face.

Donkeys will bray loudly and continuously at the approach of a storm. If cows lie down in the field together with their tails toward the wind, their tails windward then their rain about.

Like cats, the approach of a thunderstorm makes cows extremely frisky. They run up and down the field and butt imaginary obstacles at such times.

Sheep turn their heads to the wind when the day is going to be fine. But if their ears with their tails to windward it is a sure sign of rain, so experienced shepherds say. Like cows, too, they show unusual liveliness at approach of a storm.

Even the seldate pig is watched by country weather prophets, for it is always uneasy when rain is coming.

Most birds are restless when a change is expected. Rain is indicated by guinea fowls and peacocks squalling, by parrots whistling, and by pigeons returning home unusually early.

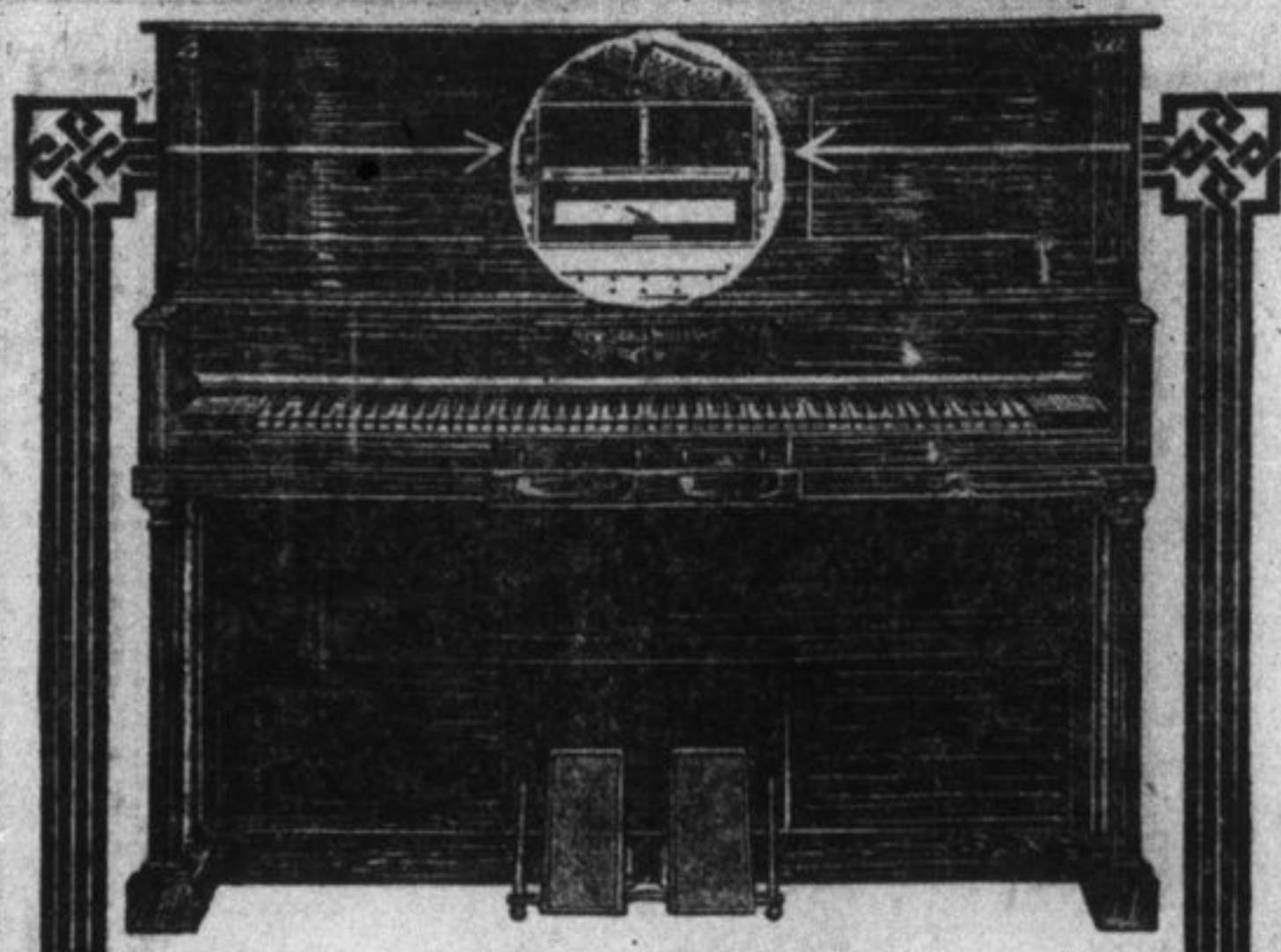
