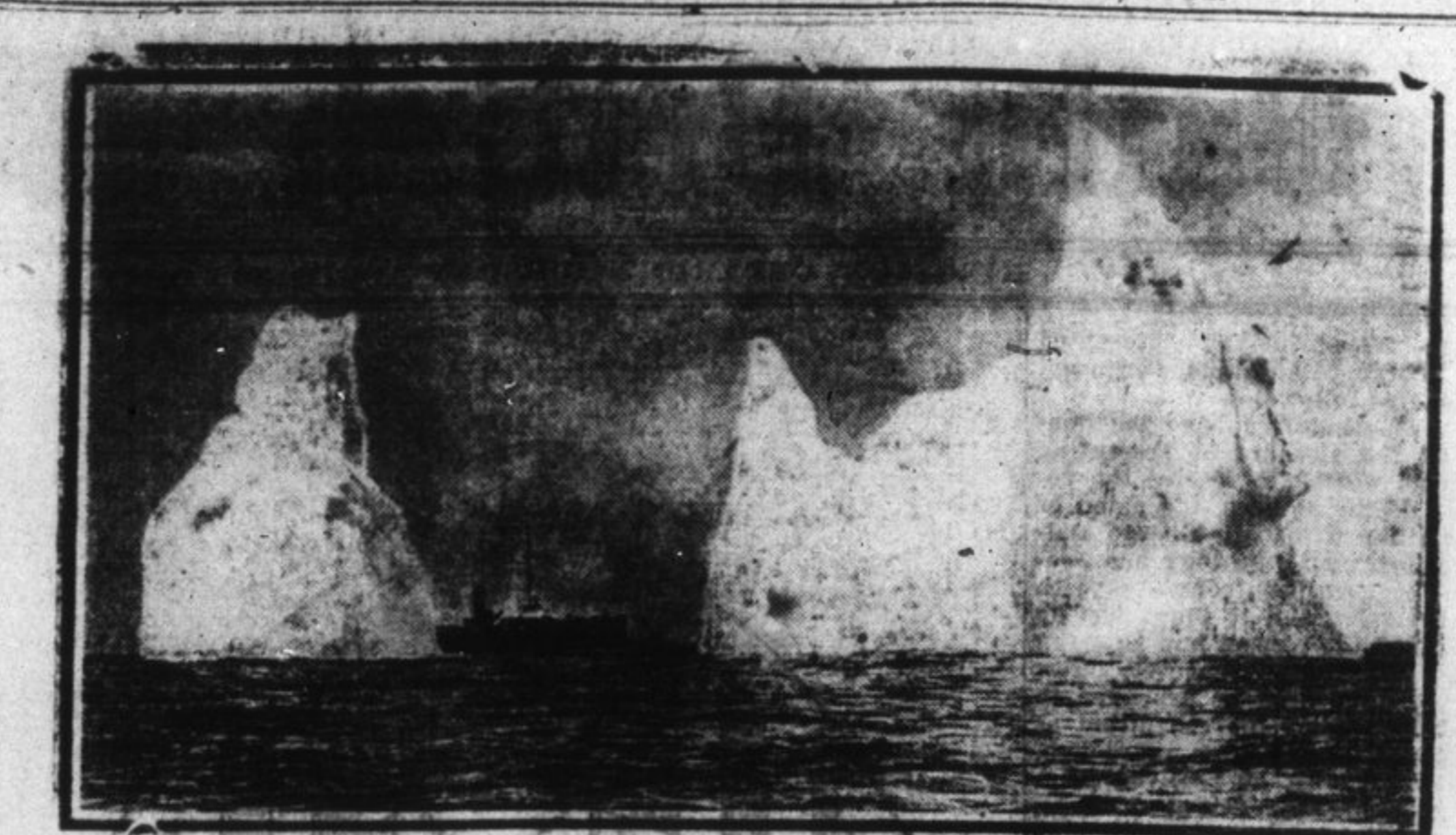

FINANCIAL MATTERS
U.S. HAS THE LARGEST INVEST-
MENT IN MEXICO
Total of American Investments in
That Country Placed at \$1,037,-
775,000
New York, April 29.—The estimated amount of money invested in Mexico totals \$2,434,244,420, of which \$793,187,240 represents Mexican capital, leaving \$1,641,057,180 for foreign capital. Contrary to the very general opinion the greater part of this is owned in the United States, the share of that country in Mexican investments being put at the sum of \$1,067,775,000. British capital is a poor second in the list, being down only for \$221,302,800. France comes next with \$143,446,900; and all other countries are grouped together and stand for \$118,636,380.
The largest single item is railway stocks and bonds, which show a total of \$1,026,622,100, of which \$664,330,000 was contributed by the United States, Great Britain being down for \$168,917,800, which is more than \$20,000,000 in excess of Mexican capital so invested. Only about 20 per cent. of the money invested in railways in Mexico belongs to Mexicans.
British investors lead in three lines, viz., National bonds, timber lands and electrical rails and power. The figures for national bonds are: Held by English, \$67,000,000; by French, \$60,000,000; by Americans, \$2,900,000; by Mexicans, \$21,000,000. The American capital invested in mines and smelters is nearly \$250,000,000, or about three-quarters of all the money so placed in Mexico. Much has been said about British capital invested in oil, but it is only \$19,000,000, whereas the American investments reach \$15,000,000.
C.P.R. Decrease Larger
Montreal, April 29.—Traffic earnings for the Canadian Pacific Railway company for the third week in April were \$2,100,000, as against \$2,695,000 for the corresponding week last year, a decrease of \$595,000 or twenty-two per cent. This is the largest percentage decrease shown since the third week in February.
For a time it seemed as though C.P.R. earnings had taken a definite turn for the better, but the showing made so far this month has been disappointing. The decrease of twenty-two per cent. for the third week of April compares with declines of fourteen and fifteen per cent. for the first

and second weeks of the month. The largest percentage decrease shown yet this year was one of twenty-six per cent. for the first week in February, and the smallest 12.9 per cent. for the last ten days of March.
Grand Trunk Decreases
Montreal, April 29.—Grand Trunk gross earnings for the third week of April were \$992,502, a decrease of \$86,846, or slightly in excess of eight per cent.
Telephone Financing
Boston, April 29.—The entire \$30,000,000 twenty-year five per cent. notes or six operating companies of Bell's system have all been sold by bankers who purchased the issue. The \$2,500,000 Cleveland Telephone Co. notes have not as yet been formally approved by Ohio commission, which has jurisdiction in the matter, but with this technical exception this financing has been fully cleared up.
It will be nearly two years at least according to the present plans of President Vail, before American Telephone and its subsidiaries are again obliged to enter the money markets.
May Reorganize Wabash Road
St. Louis, April 29.—Plans for the reorganization of the Wabash railroad, now in the hands of a receiver, are completed, but will not be made public until May 1.
This became known here yesterday when Winslow Pierce, chairman of the bondholders' committee, appeared before an informal meeting of the Missouri Public Service Commission. The plans will be submitted to the commission for approval on May 1.

IS NOT A TRIBUNAL
THE JUDICIAL COMMITTEE OF THE PRIVY COUNCIL
The Committee is Merely a Committee of Advice For the Sovereign—Subscriptions For Aged Writer Galdos.
Until now the judicial committee of the Privy Council has been popularly regarded as the highest tribunal of the British empire—higher even than the house of lords. In a remarkable decision just given by the committee in question, in the case of the appeal of Channing Arnold, the Anglo-American editor of the Burmah Critic, from a conviction of defamation of character by the chief court of Lower Burmah, this general view is repudiated.
The committee disclaims the idea of being a tribunal. It is merely a committee of advice for the sovereign. The sovereign declines to intervene in the courts of justice that administer the law in his name, unless it can be shown that there has been such an interference with the elementary rights of the accused, as to have placed him outside of the pale of regular law, or if there has been a violation of the natural principles of justice, so demonstratively manifest as to convince the crown that the appellant has not had a fair trial.
The sovereign, to whom every one of his nearly 400,000,000 subjects, both in the United Kingdom and in his overseas dependencies, has the right to appeal from the supreme courts, as a last and final resort, does not enter into the question of guilt or innocence, but only as to whether there has been a fair trial, such as every citizen, no matter how humble, is entitled to the throne can be made.
The judicial committee of the Privy Council, on which the colonial and Indian judiciary are represented, is there merely for the object of advising the sovereign in such matters as to whether there is any ground or not for interference by the crown.
Thus, in the appeal by Channing Arnold from the supreme courts of India to the throne, the lords of the judicial committee of the Privy Council "humbly advised" the king that the appellant had had a fair trial by jury and that there was no reason for the sovereign to interfere. They did not enter into the question as to whether Channing Arnold was guilty or innocent of the criminal libel imputed to him.
In making this report to the sovereign the lords of the judicial committee of the Privy Council have the following to say concerning the privilege of the press, which is worthy of being noted: "Their lordships regret to find that there appears on one side of this case the time-worn fallacy that some kind of privilege attaches to the profession of the press, as distinguished from the members of the public.
The freedom of the journalist is an ordinary part of the freedom of the subject, and to whatever lengths the subject in general may go, so also may the journalist. But his privilege is no more and no higher. The responsibility which attach to his power in the dissemination of printed matter may, and in the case of a conscientious journalist do, make him more careful.
But the range of his assertions, or his criticisms, or of his comments, is as wide as, but no wider than, that of any other subject. No privilege attaches to his position.
At the same time the committee condemns the equally "false and dangerous doctrine that some privilege or protection attaches to the public acts of a judge, which exempts him, in regard to others, from free and adverse comment. He is not above criticism. His conduct and utterances may demand it. Freedom would be seriously impaired if the judicial tribunals were outside the range of such comment.
If I call attention to these expressions of opinion on the part of the lords of the judicial committee of the Privy Council, it is because while it disclaims the idea of being a tribunal, it nevertheless constitutes the highest and most authoritative expression of law in the whole British empire.
With regard to Channing Arnold, he is a son of the late Sir Edwin Arnold, author of "The Light of Asia," by his second wife, Frances Channing, of Boston, daughter of the Rev. William Henry Channing, of that city. Channing Arnold is therefore a nephew of Lord Channing, the only American-born citizen who has ever been created a British peer of the realm—of course after being duly naturalized as an Englishman.

MANUEL REPORT DENIED
Ex-King of Portugal Not Seeking Separation.
Rome, April 29.—Officials of the congregation of the Sacraments deny the report that Manuel, ex-King of Portugal, and his wife, Princess Augustine Victoria of Hohenzollern, have both applied to the vatican for an annulment of their marriage. Cardinal Gasparri, a member of the congregation of the Sacraments, says that if such an application had been impending the members of the congregation would have been notified of it at their meeting last Saturday.
The story was that the fact of the application for an annulment of the marriage has been kept very quiet because the kaiser, as the head of the house of Hohenzollern did not wish any scandal. For this reason it was said, the vatican at the request of the kaiser arranged that the matter should come before the congregation of the Sacraments instead of the Tribunal of the Rota.
The king was married at Sigmaringen on September 5 last. About a fortnight after the wedding the bride became very ill and was taken to a hospital. Her husband remained with her until she recovered.
THE TA-TAO DANCE.
Difficult for Partner to Keep Straight Face During Gyration.
London, April 30.—"Do you know the ta-tao?" is the common question now on the tongues of the fashionable. The new dance is the successor of the tang-tang.
It is Chinese; it is over 2,000 years old; it has six movements and is "mainly a rhythmic" dance. The dancers dance with their hands and arms as well as with their feet. This waving and undulating of arms and hands makes the dance both a great novelty and also a trap for those who are not naturally graceful. Many cut a ridiculous figure in it.
In one movement the lady stands still and her partner glides up and down in front of her. The ordinary male being may not unnaturally feel he is making a fool of himself. Possibly one of the most difficult things about the ta-tao will be for the lady to keep a straight face during this movement.

WHIP'S NEWSPAPERMAN
Cleveland Suffragist Wields Black-snake Because Article Offensive.
Cleveland, April 30.—True to her declaration that women can protect themselves if equal suffrage is given them, Mrs. S. P. Burstein horsewhipped two newspaper men who, she believed, were responsible for an article at which she took offense.
Mrs. Burstein did not call on any male member of her family, but started out alone to administer chastisement. She did not return home until she had wielded a blacksnake on the two who, she says, criticized her unfairly.
A poem published in the issue of April 24th, of the True Voice, a newspaper published here, Mrs. Burstein believed referred to her. It mentioned no names.
Lack of Boat Houses
Since the military authorities have prohibited the erection of boat houses on their property and as the C. P. R. will give no more ground to boat owners for their use, there is a great scarcity of boat houses and boat-house sites in the eastern part of the city. A great many owners of boats are worrying about a place for the quickly approaching season.
