

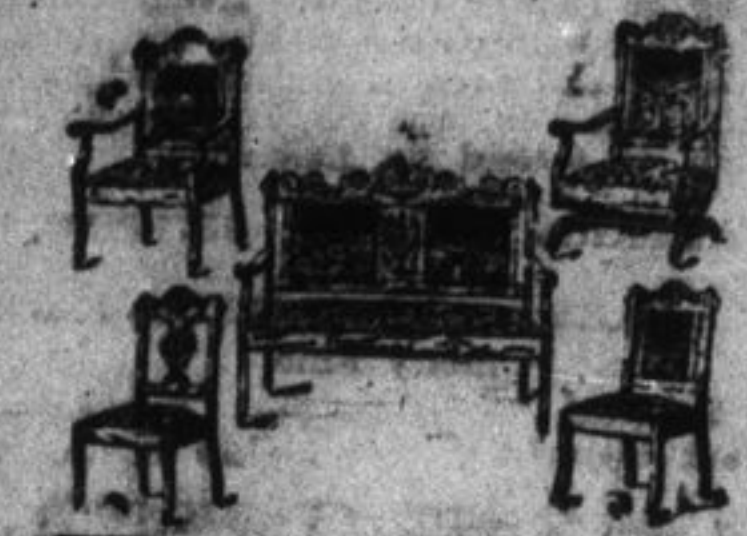

NOTRE DAME NEW WING

BLESSED AT SPECIAL CEREMONY TUESDAY MORNING

Archbishop Spratt Officiated— Chapel Was Consecrated— Father Kelly, of Smith's Falls, Preached the Sermon.

The official opening and blessing of the new wing of Notre Dame convent coupled with the consecration of the new chapel contained by the same, was observed on Tuesday morning before a large gathering. The public was admitted to the ceremony in the chapel at 8.30 o'clock, after which mass was celebrated by Archbishop Spratt assisted by Rev. Father A. J. Hanley and Rev. Father R. T. Halligan.

Following mass an eloquent sermon was preached by Rev. Father Kelly, of Smith's Falls who based his text in the twelfth chapter of Daniel. The principal points brought out in the sermon included the duty of church members to stand by and carefully assist the highest standard of virtue and perfection in the girls under their careful guardianship. Faith must be observed in the church for without it, it not only displeases but is also a hindrance to the furtherance of God's work.

As the fathers of the church instill good and noble deeds into the minds of its adherents, so likewise do the sisters over the young girls who enter the convent. Father Kelly here paid a warm tribute to the sisters and asked what duty we owed them? In answer, he asserted that it was the duty of everyone present to support them at all times and uphold the honor of the church. The young girls who have passed under these sisters' care some time in their early years, will always have a respect for them and when they reflect back upon their convent days they will always remember the dear words spoken there. Women's influence upon the world has a more telling influence than that of the men, declared the speaker, because they possess a stronger allegiance to the church. If nothing more, then, we should uphold the sisters and encourage them along in their wonderful work.

It was agreed to purchase a paper press for use in the hospital.

To Hold Reception.

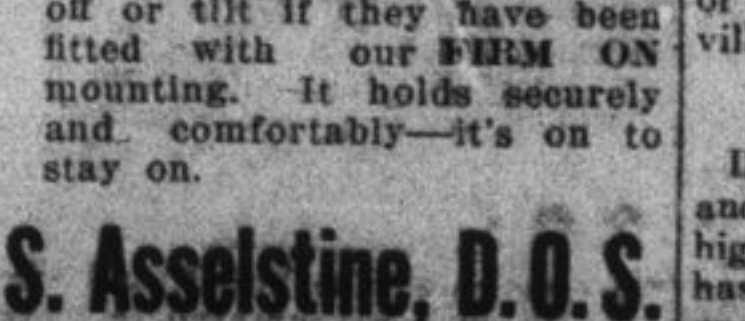

GROWING OF POTATOES THE WOMEN ARE GLAD

MONEY RAISED FOR COUNTY OF THEIR TRANSFER TO PORTSMOUTH PENITENTIARY

As the Quarters There Are Most Modern—Two of the Women Were Convicted of Murder.

The population at the female quarters at the Portsmouth penitentiary was increased by nine on Monday afternoon, by the arrival that number of prisoners from the penitentiary at Edmonton, Alta. E. H. Cummings, deputy warden; Mrs. E. H. Cummings, matron, and Mrs. W. R. Howery, assistant matron at the Edmonton prison, accompanied the women to the Portsmouth institution.

The deputy warden, when speaking to the Whig on Monday afternoon, after the women had been placed in the Portsmouth institution, stated that the trip had been made in good time. The party left Edmonton last Thursday evening at 9.30 o'clock and arrived in Kingston on Monday afternoon about two o'clock. The trip was made over the Canadian Pacific railroad in one special car. The twelve persons ate and slept in this car, which was well fitted up for the long journey. Mr. Cummings stated that he had experienced no difficulty with any of the women from the time he left Edmonton.

Only one change was experienced on the trip and that one was at Renfrew Junction. At that point the special coach was hitched onto the main train which arrived in this city about two o'clock. It is stated that the women are well pleased with the change, as the quarters at Edmonton were far from being pleasant. The Portsmouth institution has the best equipped female cells of any prison in Canada. The building was only recently erected.

Four of the women are serving time for serious offenses. Two of the four were sentenced on the charge of murder while the other two were sentenced on the charge of manslaughter. None of the nine are serving life sentences. Their sentences range from fifteen years down. Another young girl, who was serving time in the western prison was to have been brought to the Portsmouth institution, but was turned over to nuns, who agreed to take care of her.

No handcuffs or shackles were used on any of the women while they were being brought east.

POST OFFICE IN DARKNESS

Interfered With Handling of Mail on Monday Night

On Monday night, shortly after the street mail was collected and brought to the post office, the electric current went off, and stayed off for an hour, thus interfering with the sorting of the mail, as the gas at the post office cannot be used owing to the fact that the fixtures have not yet been put in place. The staff worked like Trojans after the current came on again, and, as a result, the mail was put out on time. The gas should have been ready for use, so that all such trouble of this kind could be avoided.

The Late Mrs. Downie.

Mrs. Downie, wife of Canon Downie, Port Stanley, was buried in Toronto on Monday. Deceased was one of Kingston's daughters. She was born in the north of Ireland. Her father, the late David Dixon Rogers, settled at Kingston in the forties. She was the third daughter, and was married in 1869. Mrs. Downie had a remarkably winning personality.

SAYS FROST WOULD NOT REACH THE TIME

The Concrete in Which Water and Gas Pipes Would Go. When General Manager Folger protested to the city engineer against laying water and gas services under the sidewalks in concrete, as advised by W. F. Graves, the chief engineer of maintenance and ways of the Montreal Tramways Limited, owing to the danger of the frost in winter getting at the pipes and bursting them, the engineer telephoned Mr. Graves of this objection, which seemingly had not been considered. Mr. Graves has written in reply that in his opinion the frost would not get through the paving foundation of concrete and down through the intervening clay to the excavations around the pipes in the excavations. There seems to be a difference of opinion on this point.

At Davis Drydock. The steamer Lake Michigan, that has been undergoing repairs at Davis dry dock for the past few days, was floated from there on Tuesday afternoon. The schooner Helen went into the dock after the former left and will be there for a day or so. By the latter end of the week the schooner New Dominion will enter for repairs.

The new tug, which was built for James Pendergast, of Cornwall, by the Davis company, last winter, has been named the "James Pendergast." It is thought that the boat will leave on Wednesday morning.
