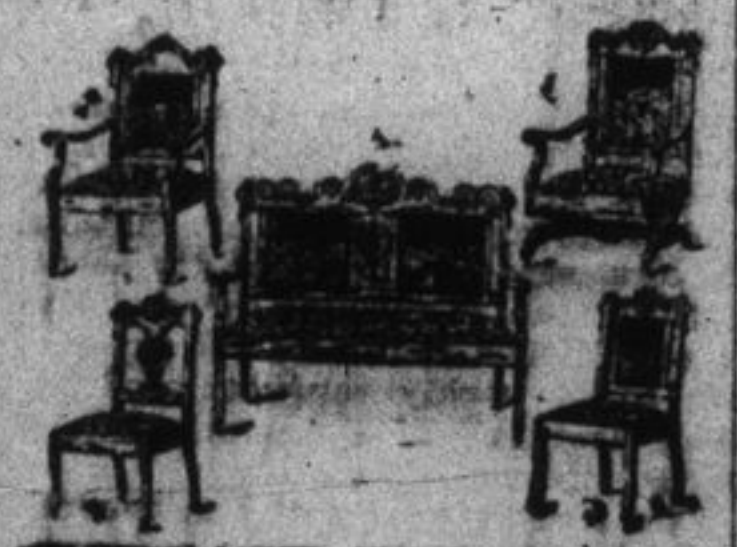

### WOULD LIKE TO HANG

Copies of Children's Protective Act in the Schools.

The W.C.T.U. held its monthly meeting in the Y.W.C.A. parlors on Tuesday afternoon. The president, Mrs. Lyon, presided. There were nineteen members present.

The union has about twenty departments. Under the department of law enforcement, realizing the enormity of the evils surrounding the children, the union is inaugurating a campaign for the betterment of these prevailing conditions. To this end it has secured a copy of the laws pertaining to the sale of tobacco and liquor to minors with the penalties attached thereto; also of the children's protective act. It thinks it would be a good idea to have these printed on cardboard and hung in public places, especially the schools, if permission can be obtained. A committee has been appointed to arrange matters.

### WILL RAISE STEAMER.

Reliance Sank in the Cornwall Canal Some Time Ago.

The Donnelly Wrecking and Salvage company have contracted to raise and deliver in the Cornwall dock the steamer Reliance, now sunk in the Cornwall canal, near Mille Roches. The Reliance is owned by George A. Shannon, of Valleyfield, Quebec. There is four feet of water over her deck. The Donnelly Wrecking company will commence work at once.

### Potato Diseases.

The Whig has posted in its window a remarkably well executed folder, entitled "Potato Diseases Transmitted by the Use of Unsound Tubers," showing in natural colors, representations of specimens of diseased potatoes. Diseases and other blights represented are potato canker, powdery scab, yellow potato, internal brown streak, little potato disease, dry rot, wet rot, common potato scab, and stem end rot. Special reference is made to potato canker and powdery scab, the latter of which occurs already in Canada and should be carefully avoided. The folder points out that, under the destructive insect and pest act of Canada any person using for seed potatoes infected by potato canker or powdery scab is liable to prosecution.

### Duffy to Race in Kingston

Definite word has been received from Duffy, of Hamilton, the winner of the Boston Marathon, that he will run in Kingston on June 3rd. Faber, of Montreal, who was second to Duffy in the Boston race, has not yet been heard from, but an answer is expected to-day.

For the motor-cycle races there will be at least two from Toronto and three from west of that place.

### To Build Block of Rocmac.

The Board of Works decided at its meeting on Wednesday afternoon to construct a block of rocmac on Sydenham street, between Earl and West streets. Afterwards it was learned that this block is to be torn up in order to lay a new water main, and another block will have to be chosen. Rocmac is said to make a good roadway, similar to that of Barrie street.

## COMING TO KINGSTON

### Commander Evans' Remarkable Pictures.

Remarkable as is the fact that Commander Evans himself, he who almost went to the South Pole with the ill-fated Scott expedition, is to come here on Tuesday evening, May 12th, to tell of his adventures with Scott and of the attainment of the Pole by the lost party, it is more astounding to know that he brings photographs to illustrate his lecture, which for beauty alone have become world-famous. Although Captain Scott himself was an excellent photographer, he took with him Herbert G. Ponting, F. R. G. S., the greatest camera man England has ever produced. It was these men who chiefly made the pictorial record of the adventures in the ice which Commander Evans will show. Mr. Ponting was enabled by his great skill to eliminate the usual icy look from all his pictures, some of which are so glorious that they invariably bring an unconscious "ah" from the audience. With some unique touch, he seemed to make the snow less white although to do this he had sometimes to make his pictures by flashlight in the long winter night so as to avoid the strong glare of the six months sun. Some of the flashlights of icebergs are masterpieces. Yet by day or by night, he was ever present in order to have his records complete. Never did his patience weary when waiting for a seal or a penguin. Whether for motion picture or for still, he was always ready. Of course he could not go everywhere, especially on the ice, and then Captain Scott's skill came in good stead. Nor did Scott ever fail, either. Although he lost his life, he did not lose his records or his negatives. With the remains of the dead party were found the negatives of the Polar trip, which were developed to make complete the chain in Commander Evans' lecture. Such are the phenomenal illustrations he uses, none of which until now have ever been shown here before. They make this lecture one of the most thrilling chronicles of modern achievement the world has been privileged to hear. It will be given in Grant hall, and will be under the auspices of the Queen's Alumnae association.
