

Potato Diseases.

The Whig has posted in its window remarkably well executed folder. entitled "Potato Diseases Transmitted by the Use of Unsound Tubers," showing in natural colors, representations of specimens of eased potatoes. Diseases and other blemishes represented are potato canker, powdery scab, hollow potato, internal brown streak, little potato disease, dry rot, wet rot, common potato scab, and stem end rot. Special reference is made to potato canker and powdery scab, the latter of which occurs already in Canada and should be carefully avoided. The folder points out that, under the destructive insect and pest act of Canada any person using for seed potatoes infected by potato canker or powdery scab is liable to prosecu-


