

> Men lut to Work on King Street on Tuesday Morning by Fotey and Gleeson Contractors.

On Tuesday morning at seven o'clock, the work of preparing for the laying of the new pavement on King and Princess streets was commenced. The tearing up of the roadway was commenced at the corner of King and Brock streets. large number of local men, who were out of work, were up bright and early for the purpose of getting employment. Foley and Gleeson, contractors, of Ottawa, who have the contract, gave local labor the preference. One very noticeable sight was noted by a Whig reporter when a number of foreigners made their appearance on the street for the purpose of getting a job but

they were not given employment. The work, which was commenced Tuesday morning, was that of tearing away the roadway between the rails of the street railroad company. According to the specifications, it is up to the contractors to do all the excavating work along the street car line, and the railroad company lays the new ties and rails. The street car track of Princess street will be thrown over to the one side of the road, so as to allow the new double-track to be laid without stopping the traffic.
