

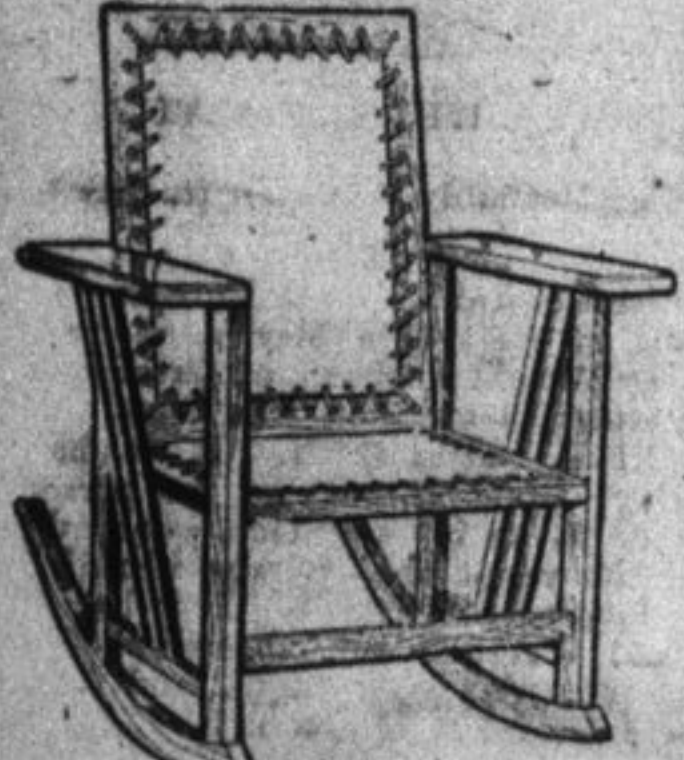

ECHOES FROM COUNCIL YEAR IN THE CENTRAL THE PRELIMINARY WORK

CITY SOLICITOR ASKED TO MAKE A REPORT.

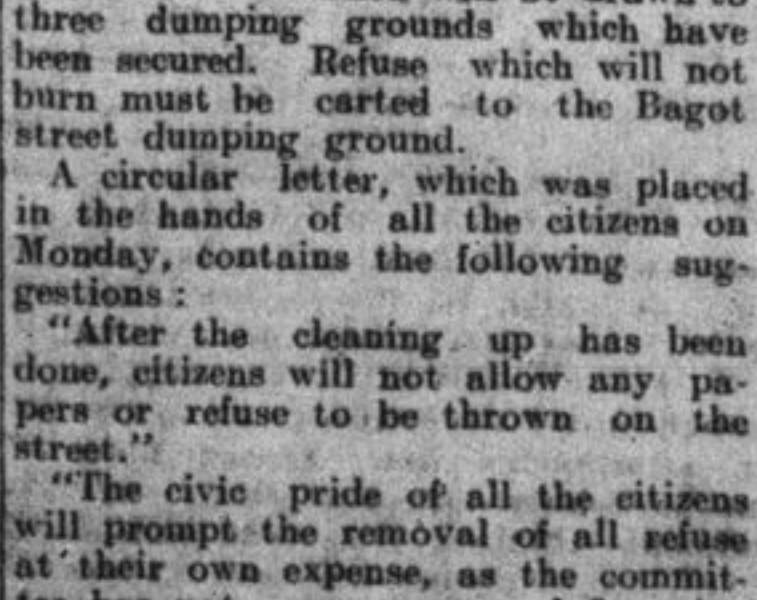
