

Self Sacrifice Should be Chief Principle in Leading of Christian Life - Facing the Tribulations -Sermon by Bishop Bidwell.

"These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall, have tribulation, but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." (John chapter 16, verse 33).

The above were the words of the text taken by Bishop Bidwell preaching in St. George's cathedral on Sunday morning.


The Late Robert Vair.
