


IT IS WORTH WHILE A THIEF WAS FOILED

FOLLOWING IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF JESUS CHRIST.

Self Sacrifice Should be Chief Principle in Leading of Christian Life — Facing the Tribulations — Sermon by Bishop Bidwell.

"These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation, but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." (John chapter 16, verse 33).

The above were the words of the text taken by Bishop Bidwell preaching in St. George's cathedral on Sunday morning.

Christ spoke these words to convince Christians, who had given up everything to be a follower of Christ. To follow out a true Christian life would give us pain. To do the will of God, regardless of the consequences would bring many tribulations. Christ said self-sacrifice should be the chief principle in leading a Christian life. The principles of Christ were hard to live up to. The tribulations were not of the watered down kind that some experienced. To some, their religious life took them to worship in a magnificent church just when they felt so inclined, and to stay away when they felt that way.

We are not naturally Christians, but have to be converted. Many were often bestowed upon people who gave up pleasure of the world for Christianity. It was left to those who had the gift or to the clergy to live up to the principles. Was it worth while trying, and undergoing these tribulations. Was there a chance of success? Christ said, "Be of good cheer; I will overcome the world." What did He mean by "overcome"? What has been the Christian experience of those who have stood by His power? The lesson to learn was that it was worth while to face the tribulations and follow in the footsteps of Christ. We should never be afraid of disappointment or failure. We must stand in His power.

The Late William Hamilton
The funeral of the late William Hamilton occurred on Friday afternoon, from his late residence, 362 Collingwood street, to Cataragui cemetery and was largely attended by the members of the local Oddfellow lodges who took charge of the ceremonies at the grave, and also assisted Rev. T. W. Savary in the services at the house, which were of a very touching nature. The Foresters attended in a body, and the Kingston canton, No. 6, was present in uniform, to pay a last respect to one who was loved by all. The pall-bearers were the three brothers, of the deceased, Samuel, Frank and James, and W. Healey, G. Warner and E. Hartwick. Many beautiful floral tributes were received by the family, among them being I.O.O.F., No. 362, Court Stanley, Local Union, No. 47, No. 6 company P.W.O.B., wreaths; I. O.O.F., No. 59, Limestone Encampment, star and cross.

IT IS WORTH WHILE A THIEF WAS FOILED

BY PROPRIETOR OF THE KINGSTON BOX FACTORY.

Who Discovered Brass Fittings, Bolters, Etc., Tied in Bag Ready to be Taken Away — The Thief Did Not Return.

Whoever bagged up a whole machine, in parts, as well as many brass fittings, including rollers, etc., at the Kingston paper-box factory, was "stung" in his purpose, as the material was discovered by the proprietor, J. G. Brown, neatly concealed beneath a large pile of cardboard. Although the manager left it there and called in Police Constable Bateson to see what might be done, the culprit in some way got away and did not take the fittings away, evidently knowing that if he did the hands of the law would be upon him. For two weeks this has lain there, and each morning and evening the spot has been watched to see if the contents would disappear. If they had, a search would have been made of the junk shops and an attempt made to run down the thief.

Mr. Brown claims that the total value of what was bagged up would take a hundred dollars to replace, and he is thankful to nip the scheme in the bud before he sustained a loss. It would have been much more satisfactory to have caught the plunderer as well.

More Men Employed
The paving work on Princess street was given a good start on Monday morning, by the addition of ten more men, making a total of eighty-nine laborers, and three more teams, making a total of thirteen teams. Owing to the raising of the track at the corner of Wellington and Princess streets, a street car was delayed, owing to the spread rails.

Gave Him a Large Increase
The First Methodist church, Hamilton, has advanced the salary of Rev. C. G. Johnston to \$2,500, an increase of \$500. The official board decided to memorialize the general conference to increase the pastoral term, for special reasons, beyond the present limit of five years, the object being to have Mr. Johnston remain after the close of his ordinary term in June, 1916.

After the remains had been prepared for burial they were conveyed to Cataragui where they were laid to rest in the Jewish cemetery. A large number of the Jewish population from the city attended the service.

A MILITARY SERVICE

HELD IN ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH SUNDAY MORNING.

Rev. S. J. M. Compton Preached to St. Andrew's Highland Cadets, and Detachments of R. M. C. Cadets, R. C. H. A. and E. C. D.

On Sunday morning parades of four military units attended the morning service at St. Andrew's church. Considerable interest centered around the Highland cadets of Rev. S. J. M. Compton's kirk, this corps having been re-organized under Capt. W. H. Craig, of the 14th regiment. The boys in kilts marched in the parade, which fell in after service, and with the R.C.H.A. band, proceeded down Queen street.

The Highland cadets occupied front pews, back of which were gentlemen cadets of the Royal Military college. The permanent units represented were the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery and the Royal Canadian Dragoons. The "Dragons" present were from the riding establishment of the Royal Military college.

As well as the sermon preached by Mr. Compton, the singing throughout was inspiring. At the offertory Arthur Craig sang a solo. Mr. Compton selected for a text Christ's statement of praise of the centurion, from St. Luke vii, 9: "I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israel." He directed his thought chiefly to the young cadets, although the application was not restricted to them. The centurian was a copy for all. Steadfast characteristics of this Roman soldier, whom the preacher ranked with a non-commissioned officer of the present day, Mr. Compton alluded to were his humility and worthy life. In conclusion the preacher appealed for allegiance to the Christ, who reigns supreme in the Christian world.


