A WOMAN RESPONSIBLE
For Persuading "Lefty Louie's" Widow to Testify
New York, May 13.—That Mrs. Lillian Rosenberg, lawyer, woman suffragist, and publicist, induced Mrs. Lillian Rosenberg, widow of the dead gunman, "Lefty Louie," to testify against former Police Lieutenant Charles Becker at Friday's session of the trial became known yesterday.
Waiting for the promised dropping of the bombshell into Becker's defence by Mrs. Rosenberg, Mrs. Boissevain sat among the reporters at the hearing. No one did she give a hint of what was coming, that the guilt of the executed gunman would be admitted by the wife of their leader.
"Mrs. Rosenberg came to me to aid her to get work," said Mrs. Boissevain. "I advised her to tell the truth. The impression may have been created that Mrs. Rosenberg was revengeful; that she was determined to get even with Becker because he had failed to free the women. That should be corrected. At no time did Mrs. Rosenberg express to me any hatred of Lieutenant Becker. On the other hand, she had no special love for Mr. Whittaker, I believe. She testified in spite of the fact that she would much rather have been left out of the case. I know that she desired to tell the truth in the interest of justice."

Deceased was widely known and held in high esteem by all who knew him. The funeral was held this afternoon from the family residence to Gananoque cemetery. Leeds lodge, No. 291, A. F. & A. M., conducted the funeral with Masonic honors. Rev. Henry Grasey, pastor of the St. Andrew's church conducted the service.
John Dillon, a highly esteemed business man of this town, passed away at the Hotel Dieu, Kingston, on Sunday, after a heroic fight of some five years with the dread white plague. CHANGES IN C. P. R. TRAINS
The Express May Leave Kingston at 11 A. M.
The new time-table now being prepared by the C. P. R., which goes into effect the 31st of May, will very likely show some important changes. It is thought the fast trains, Nos. 17 and 18, on the Montreal, Smith's Falls and Toronto route will meet at Sharbot Lake between 12.30 and 1 p. m., and that there will be two local trains each way a few minutes before or after the fast trains.
These changes will probably make an early leaving time for train 613 out of Kingston. The time is now 1 p. m., but the new time will be about 11 a. m. This earlier leaving would allow for a connection with the Winnipeg.

If these changes go into effect, it will greatly improve the connections at Sharbot Lake with the west and out of Renfrew.
