SUDDEN DEATH THE BOARD OF WORKS

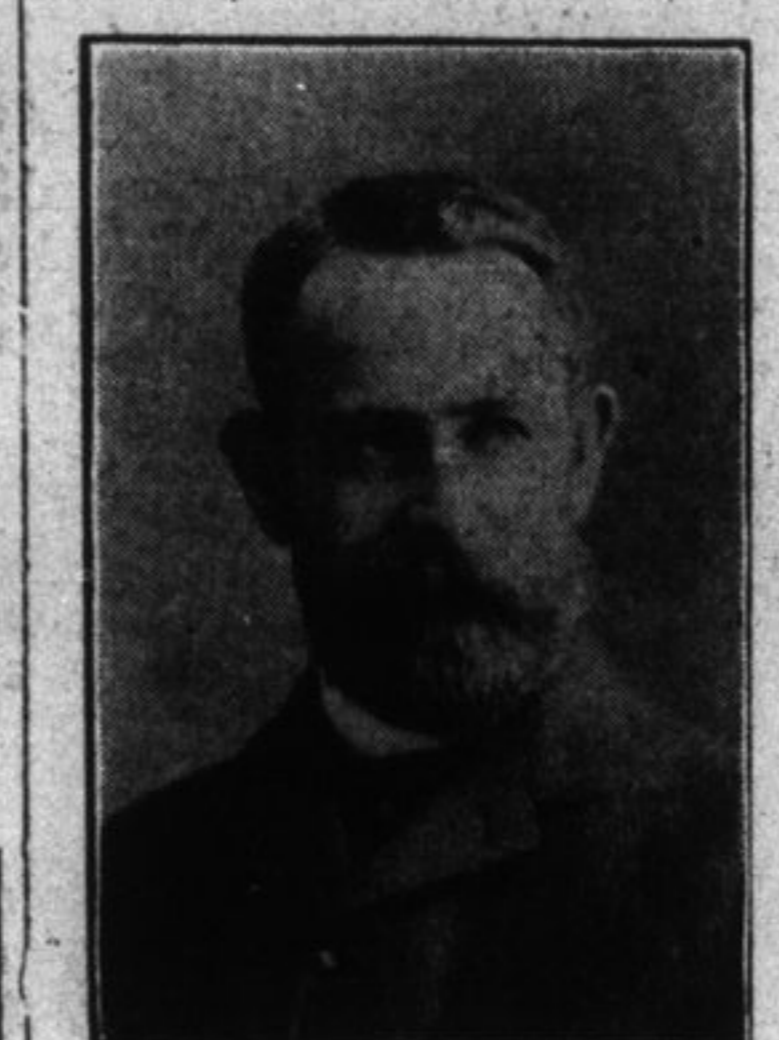
Of Prof. A. K. Kirkpatrick in New Brunswick

UNDERWENT OPERATION

FOR INTESTINAL OBSTRUCTION ON TUESDAY AFTERNOON

News of His Death Conveyed to Principal Gordon, Who Broke the Sad News to the Family of the Deceased.

The city was greatly shocked on Tuesday evening when the announcement was made that Prof. Alexander Kirkpatrick had died at Cap... Fortinville, N.B., after an operation for intestinal obstruction.

weeks ago to act as engineer in connection with the establishment of a car ferry between Cape Tormentine, N.B., and Prince Edward Island. He was taken suddenly ill on Monday night and was to be taken to Moncton hospital.

The news of Prof. Kirkpatrick's sudden passing was received with deep sorrow throughout the city, in which he was born, and where, after years of railway engineering work in Canada and Egypt, he had returned to reside for the rest of his days.

Alexander King Kirkpatrick was the son of the late Alexander F. Kirkpatrick, and was born in Kingston on the 14th of April, 1861. He graduated from the Royal Military College in 1882.

During the university vacation of six months, Prof. Kirkpatrick did a good deal of consulting engineering work for the Dominion government and private corporations.

At Queen's, Prof. Kirkpatrick was very popular with his students, being a careful and thorough teacher. He was a valuable member of the Kingston Yacht Club where he was held in high esteem.

In politics Prof. Kirkpatrick was a conservative in religion an Anglican, being a member of St. George's cathedral congregation. He was a member of the Ancient St. John's lodge, A. F. and A. M.

He is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Macdougall, of Kingston, two sons, Macdougall and George, and two daughters, Misses Lassie and Sybil. His elder son is engaged in civil engineering work for the government.

It is expected that the remains will reach Kingston on Thursday morning. The funeral arrangements have not yet been made. On Wednesday morning, the senate at Queen's met and passed a resolution of condolence.

SENDS CHAIRMAN AND CITY ENGINEER TO MONTREAL

To Confer With W. F. Graves, Chief Engineer of the Montreal Tramways, With Regard to a Pavement for Princess Street Above Clergy

The Board of Works on Tuesday afternoon authorized the chairman, Ald. J. W. Litton, and City Engineer McClelland to proceed to Montreal and have a conference with W. F. Graves, chief engineer of construction of the Montreal Tramways, limited, with reference to the type of pavement that it would be advisable to lay on Princess street, between Clergy and Alfred, this roadway having a light, sixty-pound rail.

A report was received from the city auditor that he could not pass accounts or the pay list for the construction of a sewer in the laneway above Bagot street, from West to Earl street, as this is private property.

The Hotel Dieu authorities asked for permission to place a stepping-stone on the walk in front of that hospital on Sydenham street. The engineer said that to do so would be a violation of the by-law, as the stone would be an obstruction.

The board again discussed the request of Roddy and Monk for the purchase of No Name street, near St. Catharines street, and finally decided to take no action.

Mayor Shaw wrote the board complaining, on behalf of residents of Lower Bagot street, that material was being dumped down there that was a nuisance and should be removed to the proper place.

It was decided to ask council for permission to treat King street west from Barrie to Centre and Princess street, from Alfred to the city limits, with an asphaltic oil or liquid asphalt, and to charge the cost to the property owners, and that tenders be called.

Ald. Litton (chairman), Couper, O'Connor and Sutherland were in attendance.
