The sessions of the Kingston Methodist district, which opened at Sydenham street Methodist church on Wednesday afternoon, will be continued until Thursday evening. A large number of the ministers of the district were on hand for the opening of the session on Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock. Rev. Melvin Taylor, chairman of the district, presided.

On Wednesday afternoon the ministers had a private session at which two candidates were received for probation. A message of sympathy was passed to Rev. Dr. Nesbit, of Pittsburg who has been forced to give up the work of the ministry on account of ill-health. The ministers hope that it will not be long before he can take up his work again with renewed vigor.

A resolution of regret was passed over the removal of Rev. F. G. Robinson, pastor of Princess street Methodist church, to the London conference, where he will labor. Mr. Robinson has been connected with the Montreal conference for twenty-six years.

A resolution of sympathy was passed to Rev. Mr. Perley, of Verona, whose wife died a short time ago.

On Thursday evening the four Methodist churches of the city united in one gathering in the Bible school hall in Sydenham street Methodist church. Rev. Dr. Ryckman gave the address after which the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered.

In opening his remarks Dr. Ryckman took occasion to suggest that the four churches of the city should unite often in such a gathering as was present. He believed that good work could be accomplished through these gatherings. He referred to the discontent which might exist among the ministers of the gospel as a result of some men not being pleased with the station to which they were assigned by the stationing committee.

When speaking of the feeling which exists between some members of the churches the speaker stated that church members should not turn their backs on one another at the Lord's table. Come to the Lord's table and forget your grievances was the advice of the aged doctor. During the evening Rev. Melvin Taylor baptized the infant of Rev. J. A. and Mrs. Waddell, of Harrowsmith.

TO MAKE PLAN OF ROADS

So As to Have Signs Placed for Automobileists

The new Kingston and Frontenac Automobile Club held its first executive meeting on Wednesday evening, in the Board of Trade rooms. Prof. Iva Martin, the president, occupied the chair, and the chairmen of the different committees were also present.

The chief topic of discussion centered upon the marking out of good roads by placing signs with arrows printed on them, pointing in the proper direction. The first thing to be done as regards this matter is by the various members of the good roads committee taking a trip over these roads and making a chart to the several different places within their district. After this chart has been prepared, the plan is sent to Toronto, where it is checked up by the head office of the Ontario Motor League. In return, signs are forwarded with specifications and placed at the most convenient points along the route to be traversed by automobile tourists.

It was stated at the meeting on Wednesday evening that a start would be made either on Thursday or Friday to prepare a chart of two or three different routes. Dr. D. A. Black was strongly in favor of getting to work at this as soon as possible, and received hearty support from George Robertson. H. Angrove thought it a wise plan to have the roads marked out. As his reason, he asserted that there are many places quite difficult to pursue the right course, owing to the lack of these signs. At Napanee, unless it be an experienced person over the road between Kingston and Belleville, it is pretty nearly impossible for him to find his way through this town.

APPOINTED PROFESSOR

Of Physiological Chemistry, in Queen's Medical College.

Dr. A. P. Lothrop, associate professor of physiological chemistry in Columbia University, New York, has been appointed professor of physiological chemistry in Queen's University. Dr. Lothrop will take full control of the teaching of chemistry to medical students, work for which he is specially qualified by his training and experiments in Columbia University.

Ascension Thursday

Thursday, the feast of the Ascension of our Lord into heaven, was observed in the Roman Catholic churches.

Although the place of the ascension is not distinctly stated, it would appear from the Acts that it was Mt. Olivet, since after the ascension the disciples are described as returning to Jerusalem from the mount that is called Mt. Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, within a Sabbath day's journey. Tradition has consecrated this site as the Mount of the Ascension and Christian piety has memorialized the event by erecting over the site a basilica.

St. Helena built the first memorial which was destroyed by the Persians in 614, rebuilt in the eighth century, to be destroyed again, but rebuilt for a third time by the Crusaders. This the Mohammedans also destroyed, leaving only the octagonal structure which encloses the stone said to bear the imprint of the feet of Christ, that is now used as an oratory.
