Upon May 5th this ship, a staunch steel vessel bound from Antwerp 14 New York, caught fire. It burned so rapidly that there was scarcely time to send out a wireless call for beli and to launch the boats. The crew numbered forty-nine, and all excepting three, who were burned or drowned got aboard. The first boat, with thir teen survivors, was picked up after forty hours' exposure by the Franconia; the second, with thirteen, was found ten hours later. The men had suffered torments from thirst and


