**A BUILDING INSPECTOR**

**NEEDED TO CHECK FAULTY CONSTRUCTION OF HOUSES**

Question Discussed by Fire and Light Committee, and Recommendation Will Likely be Made — Revision of Fire Limits.

The need of a building inspector for the city, was emphasized by Chairman Sutherland, at a meeting of the Fire and Light Committee, held on Thursday afternoon.

The chairman pointed out that faulty construction of houses had been found to be the cause of some fires which had recently occurred, and in this he was backed up by Fire Chief Armstrong. The chairman felt that the question was one which should receive the serious consideration of the council. No action was taken by the committee, the matter being laid over until the next meeting, when it is expected that the committee will have some recommendation to make.

"Something should be done at once," remarked the chairman. "We do not know what we will be running up against one of these days." His suggestion was that a man could act both as building and plumbing inspector.

Under the present by-laws, the city engineer is building inspector, but it is admitted that the city engineer has too much other work to attend to, to give this matter the attention it should receive.

The chairman told about four fires having been caused by faulty construction around fire grates. The fire chief said that in one case, a grate had to be removed, and the tile pulled up in order to get at the root of the trouble.

According to an act passed by the legislature, every municipality must provide for the appointment of a scaffolding inspector, and the city clerk has received a communication from the government asking if such an inspector has been appointed. This matter will also be considered in conjunction with the appointment of a building inspector.

Chief Armstrong says that there is great need for the extension of the fire limits, and the question will be considered. The chairman was of the opinion that before the matter was taken up and dealt with, it would be a good idea to have the members of the committee make an inspection of the city to study the situation, and for this reason it was arranged for the members to take a jaunt on Monday afternoon next. The members will meet at the city hall at two p. m. on Monday.

When the street lighting question was discussed, Chief Armstrong pointed out the pressing need of a light at the corner of Barrie and John street, and another at the corner of John and Montreal street. Both corners were very dark, and the chief stated that if lights were not placed at these corners, a serious accident might occur some time to the firemen in responding to calls. The firemen were called to this district very often, and it was necessary to go via this route, as it was the most direct one to use.

On motion of Ald. Stroud, it was decided to request the Utilities Commission to provide for these much-needed lights.

On motion of Ald. Nickle, it was decided to ask the Utilities Commission to provide the committee with a map showing the location of the lights and hydrants, and also the size of the mains and where they were laid.

The chairman drew the attention of the members to a comment of the Lampman, in last Saturday's Whig, which read as follows:

"The Lampman thought that the firemen were engaged by the chief to fight fires and not to inspect back yards to see that refuse is carried away. The firemen, as well as 'Nick' Timmerman, must have technical knowledge as to when a yard is clean. If three firemen can be spared from the brigade for three weeks, it appears to the Lampman that there was no need of increasing the brigade as was done last year."

In reply the chairman wished to state that the Lampman was in error, in that only two firemen had been placed on the job for a week, and that this had been arranged for by members of the department giving up their usual day off during the week of the inspection. The firemen would only be on the job for one week, and not three weeks, as stated.

Ald. Sutherland, the chairman, presided at the meeting, and also present were Ald. Hanley, Ald. Nickle, Ald. Stroud, Fire Chief Armstrong and Dr. W. A. Sands, city clerk.

**A PROMOTION TANGLE**

Over Merging of K. and P. Railway With the C.P.R.

The merging of the Kingston and Pembroke railway into the Ontario division of the C.P.R. has given rise to a tangle in the employees' promotion lists which would bother the proverbial Philadelphia lawyer.

There were spare conductors at Kingston and at Havlock waiting for next regular train. A vacancy has brought the question to a head, and as a decision one way or another must be reached it is being submitted to headquarters.

The general offices of the men are at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and the chief officials will give a decision according to precedent, when the question has been considered.

Where thousands of men are employed the rules of precedence and seniority are followed rigidly. This prevents favoritism and gives every man his rights. It is only when new factors arise that there is any confusion. Where a brakeman has been waiting years for his turn he wants it when it comes. This is a new one hereabouts and many employees are interested in a decision.
