BRIGHT AND GLADSTONE

Both Had Doubts as to Other's Mental Powers

It is not always an easy matter for a man of strong convictions and native force of character to see and respect another's point of view. William E. Gladstone and John Bright were two of the strongest men that the last century produced, yet an anecdote from The Life and Work of Frank Holl, by A. M. Reynolds, shows that these great men were quite unable on one occasion at least to see more than one side of a question.

Soon after the break between Bright and Gladstone that followed a difference of opinion concerning the government's foreign policy, the artist Holl was engaged to paint the portrait of Mr. Bright. He incidentally mentioned that he was about to paint a portrait of Mr. Gladstone also.

"It must be a very painful thing for you, Mr. Bright, he hazarded, that after all these years you should have found cause to sever your friendly relations with Mr. Gladstone."

"Indeed it is," replied Mr. Bright, with a sigh. "To think that after we have trodden the same path together, in shoulder to shoulder and hand in hand, we should be forced apart in the evening of our lives! And by what? By a hodge that is beckoning him away from duty and sense. Do you know, Mr. Holl, I seriously fear that my dear old friend's mind has become radically undermined."

Later, when Holl was painting Gladstone, the subject of Bright's portrait came up.

"Ah!" said Gladstone, with much interest. "And how did you find him. It was a cruel blow—that after a life time of mutual esteem and of good work undertaken and carried through together, we should be divided on so clear a question. Tell me, Mr. Holl."

"—and here his mouth twitched for he was evidently struggling with strong emotion—"tell me, did you notice anything in the manner of my old friend that would lead you to believe that his reason was becoming in any way unhinged?"

Ingenuity in Suicide

Some years ago when there was an epidemic of dramatic suicides in Paris, a man who had visited the French capital told of an extraordinary suicide he had heard of in that gay city.

"He was a Frenchman, who was nothing if not original," said the teller of the tale. "And even when he drew despondent he planned his death in a most original fashion. He locked the door of his room in the Rue Nitot and removing the weights of the window cord, fastened them to the window itself. He added to the weight of the window by attaching six flatirons. On the sill he adjusted a large triangular bread knife, such as is used by chefs, and made ready a small balloon, capable of lifting fifty pounds.

"The ingenious Frenchman then put his head out of the window after attaching the balloon to his neck and by releasing a clamp that held the window, cut his head off completely with the improvised guillotine. The decapitated body was discovered several days later, but it was not until the balloon and head were found a week later in the field of a peasant, eighteen miles from Paris, that the method of suicide was really known."—New York Express.
