OF THE LATE PROF. ALEXANDER K. KIRKPATRICK

Service in St. George's Cathedral—Rev. W. C. Bourne and Rev. T. W. Savary officiated—The Floral Tributes.

All that was mortal of the late Prof. Alexander K. Kirkpatrick was laid to rest in Cataraqui cemetery on Friday morning. The body was conveyed at 10.30 o'clock to St. George's cathedral where the burial service was held. Rev. W. C. Bourne and Rev. T. W. Savary, of St. James church, officiated. ACCIDENT AT PERTH ROAD

Joseph Orr, of Sydenham, in a Critical Condition.

A bad accident happened on Thursday morning to a resident of Sydenham, Joseph Orr, who had driven to Perth Road station, by his horse running away and throwing him heavily against a fence, cutting his head severely and fracturing his skull. The party in question is a man of about sixty years of age. He was in the act of giving his horse a drink. The horse being on the road, he refused to take water, and Mr. Orr thinking that he would act kind to the animal, removed the bridle so it could drink freely. For his kindness, the horse repaid him by starting to run away. Of course Mr. Orr tried to hold on to the animal which threw him against the fence where a sharp rock penetrated his skull. He was knocked unconscious, and laid there for some little time before his predicament was noticed, and dressed the wounds of the injured man, who was later taken to his home at Sydenham in an automobile. On Friday Mr. Orr was in a critical condition.
