In the afternoon George W. Kyte, M.P., for Richmond, N.S., addressed a large gathering of citizens and farmers, and in a vigorous manner de-lared that the liberals in parliament were determined to continue the fight against the government's Mackenzie and Mann aid proposals at every stage in the progress of the legislation now before the commons. He intimated that the criticisms of the government's deal with the railway promoters would be put in concrete form in a series of clear-cut amendments which would place every member of the house on record in regard to the various specific phases of the whole agreement. One of the main amendments foreshadowed by Mr. Kyte, was in regard to requiring Sir William Mackenzie and Sir Daniel Mann to pledge their personal fortunes as multi-millionaires in security for the new forty-five million bond guarantee, in addition to the \$280,000,000 of public aid already granted. Anther liberal ready granted. Another libera amendment would be along the line of ensuring the economical and honest application of all moneys raised on the bond grarantee towards the actual completion of the Canadian Northern system.
