RARE GIFT FOR MONTREAL

Relics of Early Home of Famous Champlain.

Montreal, May 29.—Thinking Montreal the most suitable place to house the finest fragment of architecture in America which is reminiscent of the days of the old French domination, Dr. Finley, president of the university of New York sent a telegram to W. D. Lightball, K.C., as president of the Antiquarian Society, offering the city of Montreal the arch and side stones of the principal gateway of the chateau at Brouage, in Brittany, France, in which Samuel De Champlain, the famous governor of the first French settlers in Lower Canada, was born in 1567.

Later on it is the intention to send the stone top of the wall which used to exist in the garden at Brouage.

Donald McMillan and His Party Well in January

Gardner, Mass., May 29.—Derald McMillan and his Crocker Land exploring party were well and comfortable on January 22nd, according to a letter of that date from the explorer received by Levi H. Greenwood yesterday. The letter was written at McMillan's winter quarters at Etah, North Greenland and came out by dog team.

McMillan wrote that the first division planned to start for Crocker Land on February 7th to be followed by other divisions at intervals. He expressed confidence in the success of the trip, the object of which is to obtain geographical data. He said that during the winter he had received many visits from natives of the southern Greenland settlements.

WORKED A SCHEME

Bogus Funeral Surprises Gambling House Pickets.

Chicago, May 29.—A hearse containing an empty coffin and with automobiles decked in mourning stopped in front of William McGurn's road house and a thirsty squad of mourners entered. Once inside, the mourners suddenly became deputy sheriffs, and the house was quickly raided.

Complaints had for a year been received by Sheriff Zimmer, of the book-making and other forms of gambling which took place at McGurn's. More than a dozen pickets were continually on duty about the place. They had push buttons in fence posts, by which the house was notified when any person who looked like a deputy sheriff appeared.

Chief Deputy Peters organized the funeral. The pickets were deceived. Once in the place, doors were broken down and racing charts, poker chips and dice were found. Seventy-five men were captured.
