Montreal, May 29.-President Thomas Shaughnessy, of the Canadian Pacific, this afternoon gave an interview admitting that there had been great loss of life, making the tragedy probably the greatest in the history of the St. Lawrence route. He says that it was apparent that the Empress was rammed in such way that she was torn open midships to the screw, and the bulkbeads were rendered useless. 'He declares that the owners had provided every precaution against such a catastrophe. He thinks that officers didn't have time to rouse the passengers before the vessel settled. At low tide to-day the funnels the vessel were visible above the surface of the gulf, and government vessels are standing by to prevent other vessels running into her.
