THE LATE SAMUEL F. STEWART.
A Prominent Harrowsmith Resident And a Godly Man.
Harrowsmith, May 27.—After an illness of nearly thirty-five years, twenty-eight of which he was unable to walk, and the latter four of which were spent in bed, Samuel Finlay Stewart, of Harrowsmith, passed peacefully away on Thursday night, May 14th. Mr. Stewart was the eldest son of the late Samuel Stewart and was born in Wilton in 1841. When his parents moved to Harrowsmith, their called, Spike's Corners, and his father engaged in the mercantile business. After leaving public school, Mr. Stewart graduated from Georgetown Business College, and entered in business with his father, although, retirement, he, with his brother Charles, took over the business, running it under the name of S. F. Stewart & Bro.
When still in the prime of life, on account of ill-health, he was compelled to retire. This seemed a cruel lot coming as it did at his time of life, and activity, but was received by him in the same patient spirit which he exhibited during the many years of suffering which followed.
While engaged in business Mr. Stewart also held the position of postmaster and notary public. In politics he was a staunch conservative, and in religion a Presbyterian, and was entirely due to his father's, father-in-law and his own efforts that a Presbyterian church was built in Harrowsmith, in which church he held the office of secretary-treasurer and pastor for thirty-five years.
In 1873 he married Frances Cecilia Shibley, daughter of the late Charles Shibley, who predeceased him on November 20th, 1913, after a life devoted to the care of her invalid husband. He is survived by his son, Charles Shibley Stewart, and daughter, Flora B., both of Harrowsmith; one brother, Charles of Toronto, and two sisters, Mrs. J. P. Day and Miss Isabella Stewart, of Harrowsmith.
Deceased was a man of remarkable ability and of a christian character more than extraordinary. During all his years of illness and intense suffering he was never heard to complain, and always showed a marked degree of thoughtfulness toward his family and nearest, and in spite of his condition took a wonderful interest in everything and was much better posted regarding current events and the doings of the outside world than are most men.
While in business his life was an active and exemplary one, business through and through, but honesty and integrity first, a life that might well be held up as an example to young business men of to-day. But his true greatness was shown even more during his illness by his patience, courage and consideration of others, more than all by his faith in his God.
In his death his children have lost a devoted and indulgent father, the church an ardent supporter and the community a friend, advisor and helper. Although half of his life was spent as an invalid, it is impossible to measure its influence upon the Harrowsmith community. No one with whom he came in contact could help but benefit by it. In the words of the Rev. A. A. Acton, who conducted the principal services, he could have said with the apostle Paul, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith."
GIRL SMARTER THAN BOY
California Educator Compares Intellectuals of the Two Sexes.
San Francisco, May 29.—Girls are smarter than boys. Standardized tests of the relative intellects of the sexes, for age, favor the physically weaker sex. This is what Lewis H. Terman, associate professor of education at Stanford University, told the San Francisco Teachers' Institute.
Prof. Terman explained that the difference was one rather of temperament and emotion than mind, however. He also pointed out that ancient theories when he said:
"Work that is the most rapid is the most accurate."
"Children seven or eight years old should not go to school more than an hour and a half a day."
"Grouch, grief, loss of sleep—all these things have a direct effect on intelligence."
FARMS TO REPLACE JAILS
Hon. W. J. Hanna Issues Regulations for Management.
Toronto, May 29.—To carry out the policy of superseding county jails with industrial farms in Ontario, Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary, issued today, the regulations to be used in the management of these new penal institutions. The regulations, which are sixty-seven in all, are based on the practice which has been successful at the farm near Fort William.
The regulations, which are approved by order-in-council, declared that any person convicted of being found drunk or disorderly in a public place within three months after a prior conviction for any offence may be committed to an industrial farm for an indeterminate period, not exceeding two years.

MARRIED PA'S CHAUFFEUR
Ingersoll Watch Head Loses Adopted Daughter.
New York, May 29.—Robert H. Ingersoll, president of Robert H. Ingersoll and Bro., manufacturers of the Ingersoll watch, gave out a type-written statement saying that his eighteen-year-old niece, Naomi Noland, had married his chauffeur, Arthur Liberty, denouncing the chauffeur and intimating that proceedings for the annulment of the marriage might be taken.
Miss Noland, who is a daughter of Ellis A. Noland, of St. Marie's, Idaho, a passenger engineer on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad, has lived with the Ingersolls for several years, practically as a daughter. For the last two years she has been studying under the direction of her uncle and aunt for a musical career. The chauffeur, who according to Mr. Ingersoll, "practically stole" the girl, has been in the employ of the Ingersolls for two years. He bears the name of Laliberte, which he shortened for the sake of convenience to Liberty. He comes from St. Johnsbury, Vermont, and has been preparing to return there to open a garage soon after the marriage, which took place about ten days ago in this city.
The Ingersolls did not learn of the marriage until Monday, when some one who did not give his name telephoned to Mr. Ingersoll.
Mr. Ingersoll made it clear to-day that his niece would have to choose between his family and her husband.

PROJECTILES' WIND KILLS
French Savant Tells of Cases in Balkan War.
Paris, May 29.—Curious confirmation of the belief that men can be killed and wounded by the wind of passing projectiles was given in a paper by Prof. Laurent, of Brussels, read recently before the French Academy of Science.
M. Laurent declared that several cases had come under his notice during the Balkan wars of soldiers who showed symptoms of cerebro-spinal disturbance, though they had no wound of any kind. The symptoms were fainting, a tingling sensation and even partial paralysis. In the more serious cases the victims became cataplectic. Sometimes death resulted. In the latter cases autopsies were performed which failed to show any nervous lesions.
It then appeared to Prof. Laurent that the vibrations of air produced by the passage of a ball and the sudden variations of atmospheric pressure, affected the nerve cells and caused the phenomena of inhibition. Prof. Laurent recalled that during the war in Manchuria, Mr. Matignon had also observed nervous inhibition produced by cannon balls. Since the speed of modern projectiles has been increased and they have become more important to warfare, Prof. Laurent looks for a larger number of cases of the kind indicated during conflict.

TO VISIT CANADA
Wife's Health Requires a Change of Climate.
London, May 29.—Donald MacMaster, M. P. for Chertsey, who has sailed for New York with Mrs. MacMaster, whose health necessitates a change of climate, will be in Montreal next week. The Chertsey liberals have just nominated Bertram Levinson, a solicitor of Australian birth, to oppose Mr. MacMaster at the next election. The latter had three thousand majority in the election of January, 1910, and was unopposed in the general election of December in the same year.
BARBER'S CLOSE SHAVE.
Has Narrow Escape as Bullet Whizzes by Head.
St. Thomas, May 29.—Edward Morrill, barber, had a narrow escape when a bullet from a rifle fired off, it is supposed, at a point a couple of hundred yards distant, tore through the window and whizzed past his head as he was shaving a customer.
The latter had his hair filled with pieces of glass from the window. No trace has been found of the man who fired off the rifle.

Some Ring for Eight Brides.
Warrenburg, Mo., May 29.—Frank Winchester Deering, of Columbia, Mo., and Miss Mary Martha Suddath were married at the home of the bride's parents, Colonel and Mrs. J. W. Suddath, in this city, Rev. Bishop Partridge of the Episcopal diocese of Kansas City officiating.
—Bishop Partridge used the full ring Episcopal ceremony and the ring used was a gold band which had been used by seven maternal ancestors of the bride at their wedding ceremonies.
