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

FARMS TO REPLACE JAILS

Hon. W. J. Hanna Issues Regulations Toronto, May 29 .- To carry out the

policy of superseding county jails with industrial farms in Ontario, Hon. J. Hanna, provincial secretary, issued to-day, the regulations to be used in the management of these new penal institutions. The regulations, which are sixty-seven in all, are based on the practice which has been successful at the farm near Fort William.

The regulations, which are approved by order-in-council, declared that any person convicted of being found drunk or disorderly in a public place within three months after a prior conviction for any offence may be committed to an industrial farm for an indeterminate period, not exceeding two years.


