COURT OF REVISION

WAS HELD AT PORTSMOUTH ON MONDAY EVENING.

Reductions Made in Assessments—
Nine Names Were Struck Off List Court Being Improperly Placed There.

The members of the Portsmouth council sat on Monday night as a court of revision and heard a number of appeals. Reeve James Halliday presided and all the members were present with the exception of Councillor Henderson. The following appeals were heard:
William Huskin, assessed for \$300, reduced to \$275; Capt. Stevens, assessed for \$1,900; reduced to \$1,000; John Grant, assessed for \$800, reduced to \$600; W. Gallen, assessed for \$800, reduced to \$600; Mrs. Grant, assessed for \$700; reduced to \$600.

A number of changes were made owing to certain property having changed hands after the assessment roll was made up.
The court struck nine names off the assessment roll which, in their opinion, were improperly placed there. The court adjourned until June 15th, when those struck off will have a chance to appear before the court if they so wish.

The council held a short meeting after the hearing of the appeals, but only routine business was transacted.
The council has secured a price on tarvia for the putting down of the dust on the road, and the matter will be taken up at the next meeting of the council.

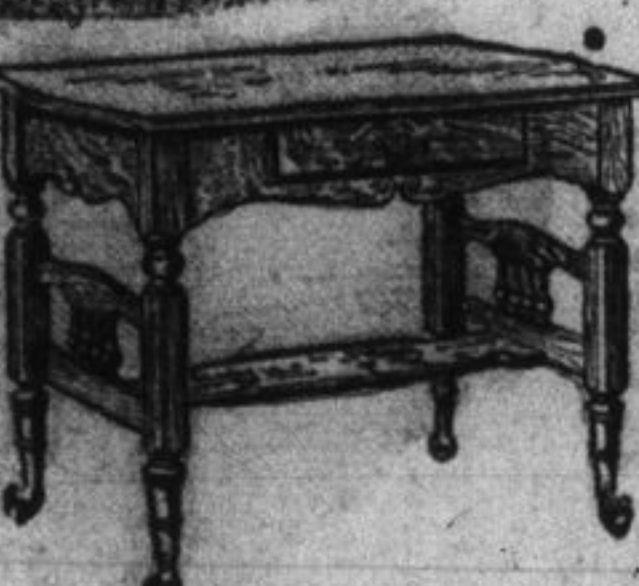

He will fly this afternoon in one of the machines from his operation base, along the water front as far as the breakwater, to Cedar Island, and in front of the commandant's residence, Royal Military College, in honor of the Duke of Connaught.

He is a member of the Salvation Army band, and had contemplated making the trip on the Empress.

GROUNDS OF HOSPITAL

ARE BEING IMPROVED BY WALKS AND SHRUBBERY.

R. N. F. McFarlane, Appointed a Governor—It Will Take Some Time to Level Off Grounds Around Empire Wing.

The board of governors of the Kingston general hospital, met on Monday afternoon, the following members being present: A. F. Chown (chairman), J. W. Robertson, Lieut.-Col. James Massie, Prof. D. H. Marshall, Robert Hendry, Canon Grout, T. F. Harrison, R. J. Carson, H. D. Bibby, T. McK. Robertson and R. Uglow.
It was decided to have a concrete walk laid round the front of the hospital, and a curb stone round the present. The contract for the work has been awarded to Alexander McCarty.

R. N. F. McFarlane, having duly qualified, was appointed a member of the board of governors.

The visiting governors for last month reported that after carefully going through all the buildings, they found the different wards, halls, etc., in a clean and orderly condition.

The spring work in the garden is in good shape and the levelling up of the grounds around the Empire wing is being followed up. The latter will take some time to complete, as considerable time and money will need to be spent to put it in a proper condition.
The new flower beds and hedges around the front of the hospital have made a great improvement. This work is being paid for by a special fund and any contributions to assist in defraying the same will be greatly appreciated.

Prof. D. H. Marshall and R. N. F. McFarlane were appointed visiting governors for the present month.

WORK OF FINE ART.

Address Presented to Duke of Connaught by the City.
The illuminated address was presented to His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught, at Macdonald park, on Tuesday afternoon, is a fine work of art. It is bound in morocco and on the first page of the address there is a view of Macdonald park entrance, while the scroll work contains a rose, maple leaf and shamrock entwined.
