TWO BROTHERS DIE
LATE JAMES AND WILLIAM MATHEWSON, PORTSMOUTH

The First Named Died on Tuesday, and the Second on Wednesday As a Result of Shock.

On Tuesday evening, at five o'clock, one of Portsmouth's old residents passed away in the person of James Mathewson, aged eighty years, and as the result of his death, his brother, William Mathewson, aged seventy-eight years, who had lived with him, died from shock and grief at ten o'clock Wednesday night.

Both brothers were born at Brewer's Mills, but James spent the greater part of his life as a resident of Portsmouth. For forty years he was a guard in the penitentiary, and also was a member of the Portsmouth council for several years. The deceased was a Roman Catholic and attended the Church of the Good Thief, from which the funeral was held on Thursday morning at nine o'clock. The late Mr. Mathewson was a member of the C.M.B.A. and in politics was a devout conservative. He was held in the highest regard by a wide circle of friends, who largely attended the funeral on Thursday. The pall-bearers were his three sons, Rev. A. E. Smart, James, Francis Melvain, John Kennedy and John Mathewson. The remains were interred at St. Mary's cemetery.

The deceased is survived by a wife, one daughter and five sons: Mrs. F. Gravel, of Portsmouth; Francis and Charles, of New York City; Neil, of Toronto; James, of Ottawa, and Herbert, of Armprior. The only surviving brother is John, who resides in this city.

The late William Mathewson, who died from the shock of hearing of his brother's passing, was at one time a professor of music in Toronto, but of late years had lived a retired life with his brother. He was unmarried. The funeral took place Thursday afternoon at Cataract cemetery, services being conducted by Rev. A. E. Smart, acting rector of St. John's Anglican church, Portsmouth. Both brothers were thus laid to rest on the same day.
