Napanee, June 4.—The ministerial session of the Bay of Quinte conference was opened in Trinity church yesterday. The report of the transfer committee showed Revs. J. B. Saunders, John Line, George J. Bishop and A. H. Emsley as transferred out of the conference and Revs. Dr. Baker, C. S. Reddick and W. J. Wood transferred into the conference.

Rev. James Chant, of Newburgh, was introduced to the conference, and in his jubilee address gave a most interesting account of early Methodism in Ontario. Three superannuated ministers were restored to the active work, ten ministers were superannuated and one notified of location a year hence, one resigned and received credentials. Six young men were received on probation.

### THE LATEST TIDINGS

PRESENTED IN THE BRIEFEST POSSIBLE FORM.

The Whig's Daily Condensation of the News of the World From Telegraph Service and Newspaper Exchanges.

William R. Perrin, architect of the Toronto civic abattoir, died suddenly. A. B. Farmer was chosen liberal candidate for seat A in Northwest Toronto.

A woman and young child were killed when an auto was hit by a car at Montreal.

The redistribution bill was not agreed upon and may stand until next session.

An immense gas gusher has been struck at Oil Springs just below the 2,000 foot level.

Sylvia Pankhurst said she would starve until Asquith received a deputation of suffragettes.

A six-year-old lad was suffocated when the walls of a Toronto excavation caved in on him.

Rev. Dr. Herridge, of Ottawa, was elected moderator of Presbyterian general assembly at Woodstock.

A salvage firm is hurrying divers to the scene of the Empress of Ireland's wreck to have her examined.

The liberal association of Toronto, has been formed, with a view to taking an active part in the coming elections.

The anti-cigarette bill and the amendments to the election act will be held over to next session of the parliament.

Ewart E. Foster, chemist, was fatally injured in an explosion which partially wrecked a building at the gas works.

Robert McAndrew, Hamilton, was instantly killed. His head was crushed by a falling tie at the east end incline.

The programme was given out for the Salvation Army memorial service for victims of the Empress of Ireland disaster.

Hon. J. J. Foy and George H. Goodeham were nominated by the conservatives in Southwest Toronto at a hard fight.

Over \$100,000 has been raised in England for the relief of the Empress of Ireland's victims' families; \$900,000 is required.

Toronto's Empress of Ireland victims are to be buried Saturday; twenty bands will accompany the remains to the cemetery.

Two bigamists, John H. Knapp and Mack Peace, were each sentenced at Sarnia by Magistrate Flack to three years in penitentiary.

William Otto Dauchret, the famous privy council lawyer, who figured in many celebrated Canadian issues, left an estate probated at 22,600 pounds.

Wireless received at New York states the Aquitania is making a wonderful run and is expected to land her passengers in New York on Friday morning.

The London Standard announces that important negotiations are pending for a consolidation of British shipping interests in order to fight the Hamburg-American and North German Lloyd companies which have been suspected of having formed a combine.

### THE FARMERS BANK BILL

The Second Reading Passed in the Commons.

Ottawa, June 4.—It was 3.30 o'clock this morning before the debate on the Farmer's bank bill concluded and the vote was taken on the six months' postponement of A. R. McLean, of Halifax. The vote was 55 to 17, or a majority of 38 against the amendment and in favor of the second reading of the bill.

The vote was not entirely along party lines. Duncan Ross, of West Middlesex, J. Angus McMillan, of Glenzary, and E. W. Nesbitt, of South Oxford, voting with the government on the opposition side, while Paul Lamarache, of Nicolett, voted against the measure from the side of the government.

There is considerable speculation as to the probable fate of the bill when it passes the commons and reaches the senate. Party lines will be broken and the fate of the bill is uncertain. The Canadian Northern bill comes up in the senate this afternoon. It will likely go through.

The health of the veteran Lieut.-Col. W. H. Jackson, Brockville, is giving his friends and relatives a good deal of anxiety.

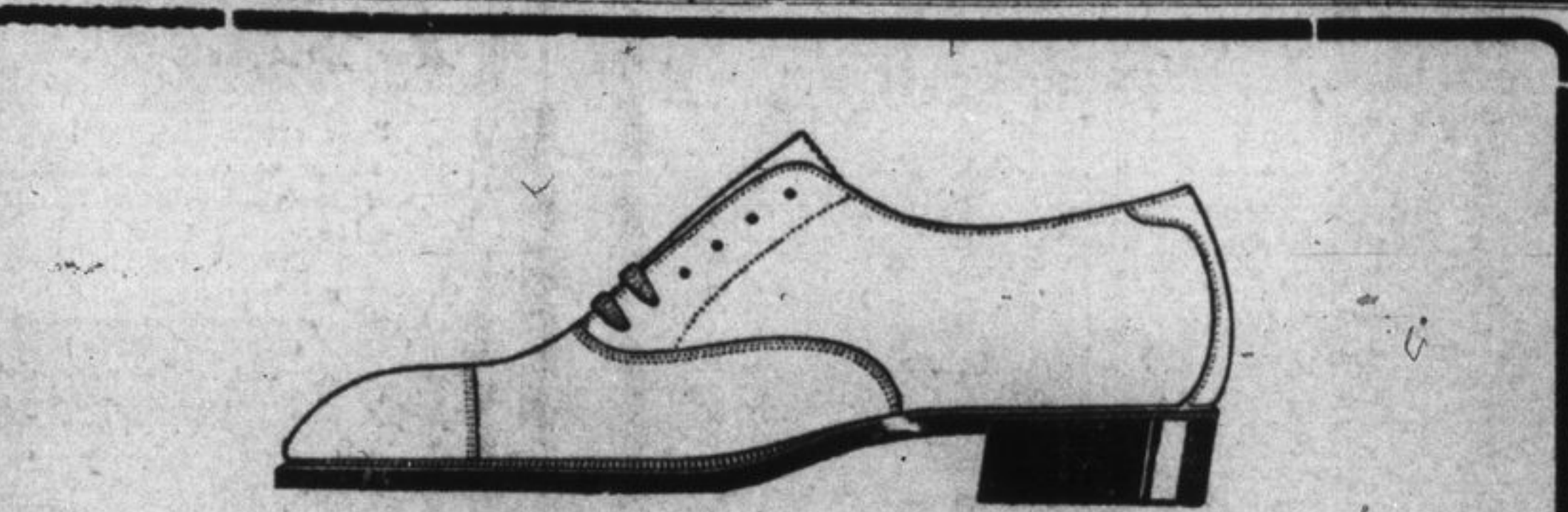
