ROAD PAVING AGAIN

BOARD OF WORKS CONSIDER QUESTION AGAIN.

Street Railway Company May Agree to Put Heavier Rails on Princess Street Between Clergy and Barrie.

The Board of Works, this afternoon, will try and come to a decision with regard to the paving of Princess street, from Clergy to Alfred. Ald. Litton, the chairman of the board, expected to have definite word this afternoon from the street railway company as to whether it would bear the expense of putting down heavier rails between Clergy and Barrie streets, a distance of 300 feet. The cost to the company would only be about \$560. If the company does this, Ald. Litton said he would be favorable to pave only up to Barrie street, and leave the rest of the roadway until next year, macadamizing and rolling it in the meantime. The same kind of pavement on the lower part of Princess street would be used on the block above Clergy.

Ald. Litton will ask the Board of Works to pass upon the paving of a number of residential streets, particularly University avenue, from Princess to Stuart streets.

Ald. Litton thinks that this year is a particularly good one to get road work done, as lots of laboring men can be secured owing to building operations being rather light. There will not be half as much building in Kingston this year as last, and roadwork would give employment to many men.

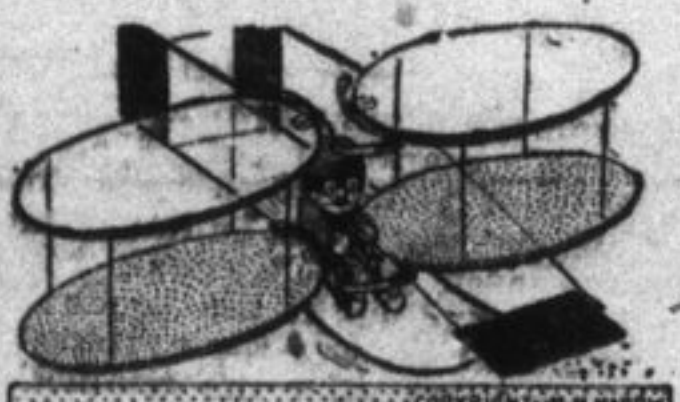

WORKINGMAN'S DAY.

Eight-Hour-Day is Too Short, Says Conservative M. P.

Labor men throughout Canada will be interested in the statement made by Dr. J. W. Edwards in the commons, when he condemned the eight-hour day. Dr. Edwards' statement was made in the course of a discussion of the unemployment which has brought hardship to so many Canadian workingmen and their families in the last couple of years.

The conservative member first declared his opinion in regard to legislation shortening the hours of labor. "I am opposed to parliament urging upon members to pass through legislation favoring the shortening of hours of labor beyond what is a possibility on the farm. I do not think it is wise legislation." He passed to a statement as to the eight-hour day.

"I think the eight-hour day is too short a day in the city," he declared, "and that we have made mistakes in the past in listening to the demands of unions and others for an eight-hour day. There are certain occupations where an eight-hour day is quite long enough, perhaps too long. . . . I say most emphatically that an eight-hour day for a carpenter or a mason is entirely too short."

Earlier in the session, a bill to shorten the hours of labor on public works was introduced by Alphonse Verelle, M.P., the former president of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress. By some tactical moves the government "shelved" the bill so that Mr. Verelle was unable to bring it before the house for consideration. Now the labor men have the spectacle of a supporter of the government declaring that at eight-hour day in the city is too short and that mistakes have been made "in listening to the demands of the unions and others."

The late Mrs. Charles was married when a girl of tender years, the ceremony being performed by Rev. Mr. Godfrey, the same pastor who christened her in the Episcopal faith. By this union four children were born, three of whom are living, William H., Hiram H., and J. F. Charles.

Mrs. Charles was a lady who performed her duties, either of a home of public nature, in such a manner that they appeared as pleasures, making many friends of those with whom she came into contact. All her life she had been a sufferer from rheumatism, and in April she went to Petoskey, Mich., to take the baths. She contracted a bad cold which settled into bronchial pneumonia. There are left to mourn her loss a husband, three sons, two sisters, Mrs. C. M. Seeber, of Toronto, and Mrs. T. H. Ferguson, Kingston, Ont., who cared for the deceased during her last illness. The late Mrs. Charles held the office of elector in the order of the "Eastern Star," and was the beloved commander of Swastika No. 86, Macabees of the world. The funeral was conducted on Friday, May 29th.

STOREKEEPER FINED

FOR SELLING GOODS AFTER THE CLOSING HOUR.

Was Fined \$10 and Costs in the Police Court on Friday Morning.—Another Storekeeper Was the Complainant in the Case.

For an infraction of one of the city by-laws, in having kept open his store after 6 p.m., for the sale of a suit of clothes and a pair of boots, a merchant was, on Friday morning, fined \$10 and costs, by Magistrate Farrell, in the police court.

Another storekeeper was the complainant in the case. Both men have shops on Princess street, and near each other. The accused pleaded guilty to the charge but stated that he was not at the store at the time, and that the sales had been made by his wife, who was not acquainted with the by-law. However, the magistrate did not take this for an excuse and imposed a fine of \$10 and costs, although the prisoner pleaded hard to be given a chance, stating that it would not occur again.

This is the first case of this kind which has been before the magistrate in a number of years. There was a time, however, when it was quite a frequent occurrence to have shopkeepers summoned before the magistrate for selling after the hours set by-law for the closing of the stores.

Bert Bicum was on a charge of refusing to pay \$10 wages to a girl, Mary Marshall. The evidence went to show that the girl left her place of employment without giving the necessary notice and that she was, therefore, not entitled to her full amount. The magistrate fixed the amount for Bicum to pay at \$5 and costs.

Christian Endeavor Rally.

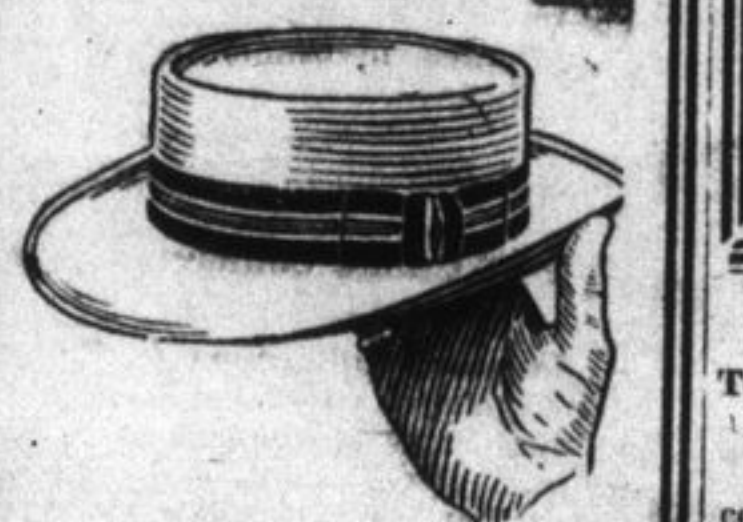
