THE TRADES COUNCIL

PUTS A QUESTION TO THE KINGSTON MERCHANTS.

Why do They Engage Outside Contractors and Expect Local Labor People to Patronize Their Stores.

Considerable business required the attention of the Trades and Labor Council at its meeting on Thursday evening.

A resolution was passed asking the merchants of Kingston why it is that they are always urging the local laboring people to refrain from sending out of town for goods when the merchants will bring in out-of-town firms to make alterations to their places of business. This resolution is to be sent to the Retail Merchants Association.

The delegates who attended the Labor Educational convention held in St. Thomas on May 23rd made a report of the trip.

Some of the members asked why the city engineering department is putting gravel, which is being taken off Princess street, in places where it is not required.

A resolution of sympathy was passed to the families of the people who went down on the ill-fated steamer Empress of Ireland and also to the Salvation Army, which lost so many of its officers.

TO BE ORDAINED

In St. George's Cathedral on Sunday Morning.

The examinations for deacon's and priest's orders in the Anglican church have been conducted by Rev. W. F. FitzGerald, of Kingston, and Rev. H. H. Bedford-Jones, of Brockville, who are the bishop examining chaplains. Beginning on Thursday, special addresses, by way of preparation, are being given to the candidates by Bishop E. J. Bidwell, Rev. W. F. FitzGerald, Rev. H. H. Bedford-Jones, and Rev. R. C. Blgrave, rector of Christ church, Belleville, the last of whom will preach at the ordination service to be held on Sunday afternoon in St. George's cathedral.

The following are the candidates to be ordained as deacons: L. R. G. Walker, L.T.H., of Dublin University, England, for Bannockburn; R. C. McGee, of St. Stephen's House, Oxford, England, for the second curacy of St. George's cathedral, Kingston.

Ernest Teskey, R.A., of Queen's University, and L.T.H., of Trinity College, Toronto, for Westport; Rev. H. H. Bulteel, of Trinity College, Toronto, for Coe Hill; Rev. F. Williamson, of Trinity College, Toronto, for Sharbot Lake; Rev. G. Goodhead, of Trinity College, Toronto, for Bancroft.

Mr. McFee, who is coming to St. George's cathedral, received his training for the ministry in St. Stephen's house, Oxford, Eng. Subsequently he entered into business life and has been for the past six months teller in Molson's bank at Brockville. He has thus received a good business training in addition to his theological course. Mr. McFee is related to some good families in Ireland.

VOTING REGISTRATION

To Take Place Next Week Commencing Wednesday

At a meeting of the registrars for the provincial registration of manhood suffrage held on Thursday afternoon, it was decided to divide the city into five sections. The registration booth for Ontario, St. Lawrence, and Sydney wards will be at the city council chamber with J. B. Walkem as registrar, Cataragui wards will register in the police court chamber with J. M. Farrell, as registrar; Frontenac ward at the court house, W. J. Gibson registrar; Rideau ward at court house, T. M. Asselstine registrar; Victoria ward, at court house, Judge H. A. Lavell registrar.

The registration will start next Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock and will continue for three days. There will be a continuous session of thirteen hours each day.

The board of appeal for the registration will sit in the police court room on Friday morning, June 19th, to hear all objections to registrations. The board will be composed of Judge H. A. Lavell, J. M. Farrell, J. B. Walkem and T. M. Asselstine.

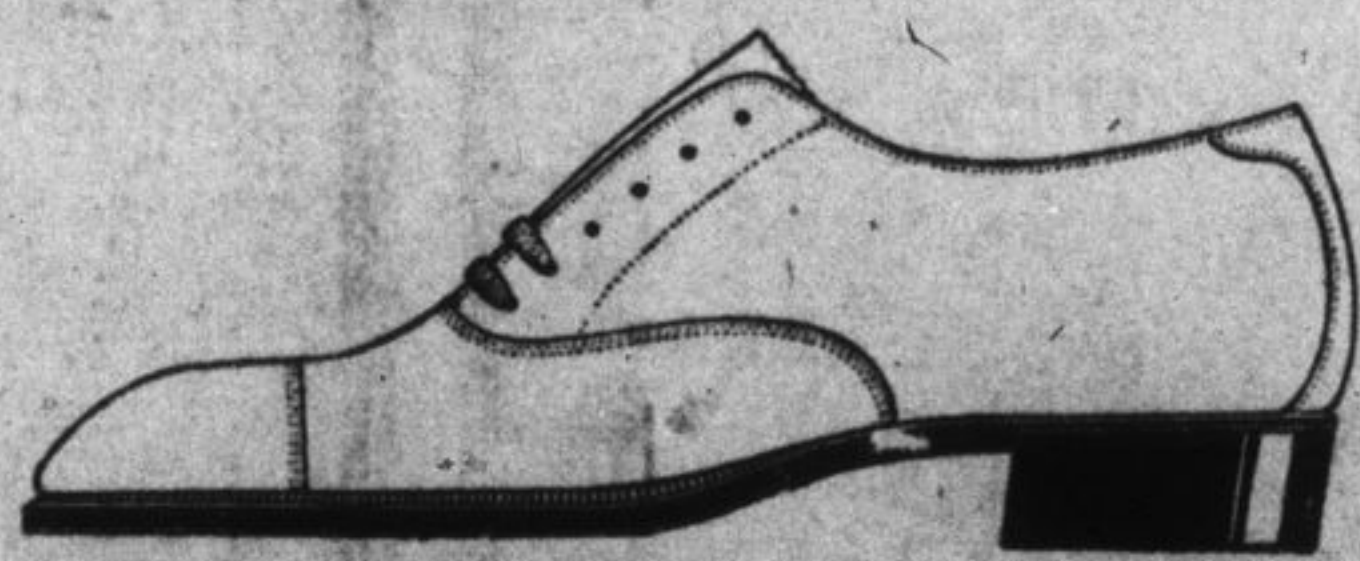
