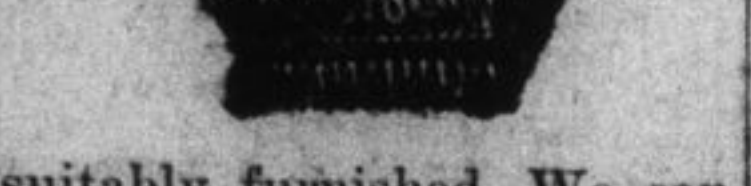

BIG WASTE OF WATER.

Has Been Discovered and Is Being Gradually Stopped.

Most Powerful X-Ray Machine.

The new Wappler (King model) X-Ray machine was used for the first time Monday morning at the General Hospital. It is a very large machine with a mass of switches, fuses and wires. It has been installed in the superintendent's office. While a Whig representative was there a photograph of a man's hip was taken. The hip was exposed to the X-Rays for 1-1/2 of a second. The electricity used was of 220 volts. This is the highest powered machine between Toronto and Montreal and absolutely instantaneous pictures may be taken. The machine was purchased from Ingram and Bell Limited, of Toronto.

The temperature at 8 a.m. Monday was 62.5 and at 1.30 p.m. 73.3 degrees in the shade. It was the first real summer day.

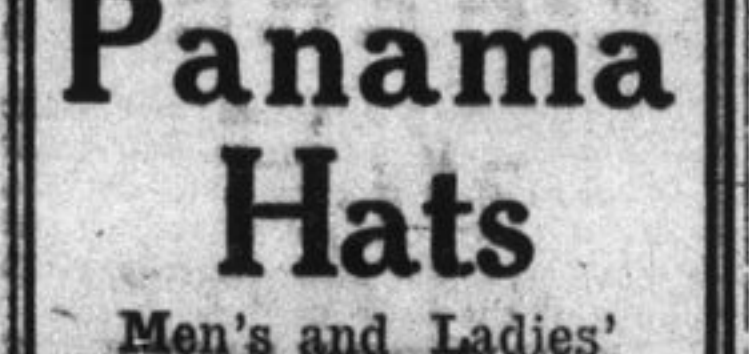

CHANCES ARE NOW GOOD
