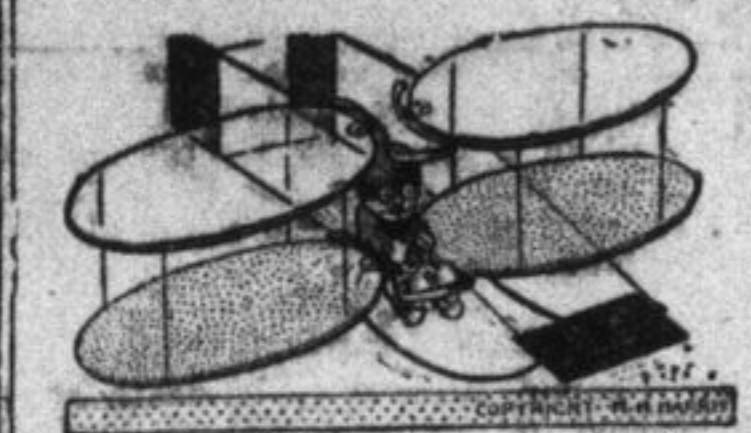

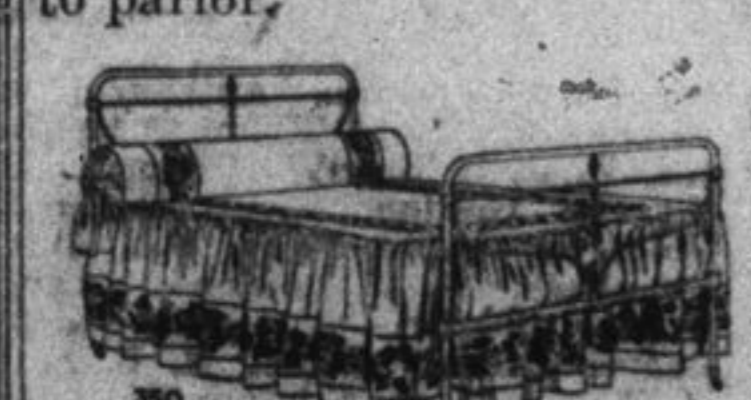

REGULAR MEETING

Of the Roman Catholic Separate School Board.

The regular meeting of the Roman Catholic separate school board was held on Tuesday evening. The following members were present: Rev. A. J. Hanley, chairman; Messrs. Behan, Cook, Cochrane, Duffy, Gibson, Leahy, Laughren and McFadden. The chairman reported on behalf of the Finance committee the steps that had been taken re school taxes and the result thereof. The report of attendance of the various classes during the month of May was read and after some discussion was ordered to be filed.

An application was received from F. J. Quinn asking to be appointed as the board's representative on the Collegiate Institute examination board. On motion the request was granted. An application was received from Mr. Fowler, caretaker of St. Mary's school, asking for increase in salary. Increased \$2.50 per month.

Applications were received from Misses O'Connor, Clearey and Guirey for the vacancy on the teaching staff of St. Mary's school, caused by the resignation of Miss McDermott. Miss O'Connor was engaged, providing the Management committee were satisfied that she had the necessary qualifications.

Applications for re-engagement were received from some of the teachers of St. Mary's school. The secretary-treasurer was instructed to notify them that applications for re-engagement were unnecessary as the by-laws of the board provided for their continuance on the staff unless otherwise notified.

The Property committee were instructed to have the necessary repairs made to the different schools during vacation.

TO WORK FOR HARRISON.

At the monthly meeting of the Woman's Christian Temperance union, held in the Y. W. C. A. building on Tuesday afternoon, the women expressed themselves strongly in favor of the N. W. Rowell, leader of the opposition in the Ontario legislature on his "abolish the bar" platform. The ladies pledged themselves to do all in their power to elect T. F. Harrison for Kingston.

REGISTRATION OF VOTERS

For the Ontario Election Began on Wednesday Morning.

On Wednesday morning at nine o'clock the registration for manhood suffrage opened at the court house, city council chambers, and the police court room. It is expected that the registration will be very large.

Mr. Levy has crossed the Atlantic sixty-three times and has had a wide experience in almost every country of the globe. He is almost seventy years of age but still spry and active and spends some of his time in sport such as shooting and fishing.

An Explanation Required.

The Imperial Oil company is very much surprised at the action of the Kingston Board of Works in purchasing 20,000 gallons of oil for dust laying at 10 1/2c. A Montreal concern offering to furnish the oil at 7c, guaranteeing it to be equal to any other oil produced for the purpose. Mr. Morris says that the people of St. Thomas were asked as to their opinion of the oil, and the chairman of the committee replied that it was very satisfactory, and that they intended purchasing it again this year.

The Board of Works complains that it had not the equipment necessary for laying the oil, but if it had made a contract at 7c instead of 10 1/2c, it could have purchased all the equipment required. Some explanation as to the board's action is necessary.

THE COUNTY COUNCIL

THE JUNE SESSION BEGAN TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

C. P. R. Train Service West of Sharbot Lake Discussed—Verona to be Made a Permanent Entrance Examination Centre.

The Frontenac county council convened on Monday afternoon at four o'clock for its June session. In attendance were: John A. Kennedy, warden; John Gray, P. J. Wensley, H. A. Calvin, John Foley, C. G. McKnight, T. J. Hawkey, Benson Coulter, L. D. Parks, Abbot Thompson, Robert McVeigh, W. J. Franklyn, J. L. Freeman, James Halliday, W. J. Donaldson, C. W. Sleath, Dr. William Spunkie.

These communications were referred to committees: Rev. A. E. Smart, inspector, Children's Aid Society, asking for increased grant.

Curtis Wells and John Ewing, turnkeys of jail, asking for increased salaries.

Deputy minister of education stating that the legislative grants for Frontenac are \$1,591.55 for public schools and \$125.95 for separate schools.

County council of Dufferin asking Frontenac council to co-operate in having the motor vehicle law amended, whereby motor vehicles would be taxed and the money given county councils for road improvement.

Joseph Duff, secretary-treasurer of Sydenham high school, asking sanitary improvements in the building and the enlargement of the athletic field.

The council adjourned until 9 a. m. Wednesday when Councillor Trustcott was the additional member in attendance.

Councillor Thompson, of Olden, reported that the C.P.R. company was not stopping its night train from the west at Tweed and points between that and Sharbot Lake so that people could come to Kingston and return home the next day.

Warden Kennedy stated that the railway company had offered to stop its night train at Tweed and intermediate points, if satisfactory to the county council, which had petitioned for better train service to Kingston. It would be necessary to accept the company's offer, by a resolution, before it would be carried into effect.

It was moved by Councillors Freeman and Spunkie, that Verona be recommended as a centre for high school entrance examinations. Dr. Spunkie said that entrance examination centres should be established at as many convenient places, as possible. One was needed at Verona and the council should authorize it.

An adjournment was made until the afternoon to give the committees a chance to do business.

The disturbance which was in northern Ontario yesterday has passed to eastern Quebec. Showers have again occurred in the western provinces. The heat wave which has prevailed during the past two days in Ontario is now spreading eastward.
