The C.N.R. bill has passed its third reading in the senate.

Six drownings were reported, Tuesday, in Ontario, while bathing.

It is believed now that the toll of the Atlantic storm will reach 100.

Parkdale liberals decided to support William McAvish, the temperance candidate.

The United States government favors a Carranza man as provisional president of Mexico.

Conservatives of Riverdale may repudiate C. J. Doughty because of his declaration for the abolish-the-bar policy.

The United States is sending a scout cruiser to Wrangle Island to rescue fifteen of the crew of the steamer Karluk.

The Ontario Railway Board ordered the Toronto Railway company to abolish running-boards from the sides of the cars.

At Woodstock, the Presbyterian general assembly adopted the resolution to continue church union negotiations by a majority of 17.

John G. Kent, retiring president of the Canadian National exhibition, Toronto, was the guest of honor at a banquet given by his colleagues.

At Port Colborne, Ont., Frederick Brennan and John Archer, while bathing, touched the old Dominion spur trolley wire and were electrocuted.
