## HOOVER FOUND GUILTY PLAN BUSY SEASON

AND SENTENCED TO GUELPH PRISON FARM

For Six Months—The Prisoner Pleaded His Innocence—Judge Madden Said the Jury's Verdict Was Quite Proper.

Found guilty by a jury in the county court of the theft of \$227 from the Dominion Express company, Samuel Hoover, the young man who acted as an agent for the company, at Mountain Grove, was, on Wednesday afternoon, sentenced by Judge Madden to the Ontario Reformatory (prison farm at Guelph) to an indefinite period of not less than six months and not more than a two year term less one day on the charge of stealing the sum of \$225, and a week in the county jail at hard labor on the charge of the theft of \$2 from the county, there being two specific charges laid against the prisoner.

Hoover had nothing to say apart from declaring that he was innocent of the charge and did not appear to realize his position when sentence was passed upon him.

The jury was out on the case one hour, and on returning submitted a report which read: "We find the prisoner guilty on the two charges, and recommend mercy."

"What have you to say as to why the sentence of court should not be passed upon you?" asked the judge of Hoover.

"I am not guilty," said the prisoner quite bluntly.

"And is that all you have to say?"

"Yes, that's all."

"Well," said his honor, "I think you have found you guilty and I think properly so on the evidence. The evidence established beyond any question that you took the \$2 you should have given to the man named Mills for his claim against the company, and the evidence also went to show that you gave no account whatever for the \$225."

Continuing, his honor stated that he would consider the request of the jury that he show mercy. However, the case was of such a serious nature that he could not give him his liberty. He then asked a case of the theft of only \$2 it would have been a different thing. But there was a far more serious charge to answer for. Had the jury not found the accused guilty he would have regarded the verdict as a miscarriage of justice and would have preferred charges of forgery and perjury against the prisoner.

The judge then passed sentence and Hoover was led away to the jail by a constable.

DISTRICT MEETING OF L.O.O.F.

Was Held in Kingston on Wednesday Night.

The annual district meeting of the L. O. O. F. was held here Wednesday evening. Representatives were present from Snow Road, Parham, Harrowsmith, Gananoque, Lansdowne and the city lodges. J. D. Donovan, district master, presided. Reports were presented showing that the order is flourishing hereabouts. Disbursements for fraternal assistance were quite heavy but the more this order pays out the more it seems to have to give.

Charles Higgins, of Granite Lodge, will be the next D. D. G. M. and R. J. Dlack was re-elected district secretary. At the close a fine speech, prepared by A. Arthurs, was given.

The W. C. T. U. held its monthly meeting in the Y. W. C. A. parlors on Tuesday afternoon. Mrs. Lyon presided. As it was the last regular meeting before the annual meeting which will be held the first Tuesday in September, all unfinished business that it was possible to dispose of was attended to.

Programme is Announced—Activities at Thousand Islands Yacht Club Will End September 7th—Polo Tournament Will Close Season.

BUSINESS MEN.

A Big Party is to Come East This Month.

Two hundred western business men are about to start east on a trip. They represent the Edmonton Industrial Association and will travel in a special Grand Trunk Pacific train composed of observation cars and standard sleepers with two dining cars and baggage cars attached. 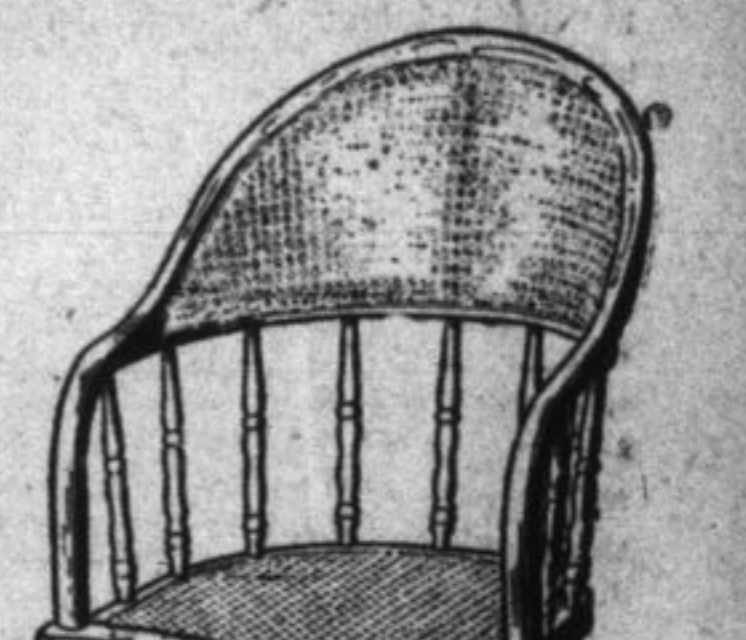
