## IN MARINE CIRCLES

### WELLAND CANAL MAY BE READY FOR LOCKING ON SUNDAY

Steamer Kimmount On Her Way to Kingston With Grain Held Up As Result of Accident — Movements of Vessels Reported Along the Harbor.

It will be Sunday and possibly later before vessels will be locking through the Welland Canal. Advice received in marine circles Saturday morning stated that a dam was being built so as the necessary repair could be carried on. It is impossible to tell just when the work will be completed, but it may be ready by Sunday.

The steamer Kimmount, grain-laden from Port William, is one of the vessels tied up at the Welland canal as a result of the accident. She has grain for Richardson's elevator and the Montreal Transportation company and is expected to reach here by Monday had it not been for the accident she would have been in port Saturday morning.

The yacht Ramona cleared on Saturday for Clifton where she will remain for the entire season.

The schooner Katie Eccles arrived from Oswego with coal for Booth & Co.

The schooner Ford River cleared Saturday for Erie.

The steamer Sowards cleared for Oswego.

## STEAMSHIP EARNINGS.

Traders Express Uncertainty With Regard to Preferred Dividend.

The position of Canada Steamships securities is causing a great deal of interest on the Montreal and Toronto markets. The feeling on the street is one of uncertainty regarding the preferred dividend in view of the present depression in industrial circles and the consequent heavy falling off of inland freight traffic.

To pay their dividend and fixed charges the company has to earn in the neighborhood of \$1,500,000, or about equal to the estimated earnings of last year, when the allied companies enjoyed a considerable measure of prosperity. The attitude of the investment public is also critical.

The selling of the stock was undoubtedly for some inside interest, although there is a pool operating in Montreal which was to protect the stock, but it is believed this group is already at the limit of its agreement. James Carruthers, president, said that business, both passenger and freight traffic, was good and beyond the expectations of the company, but the street is inclined to believe that continued prosperity is doubtful, when the railways are showing heavy traffic declines and their industries are operating at reduced capacities.
